

When this case was reported to the Red Cross the family was destitute and one child was dying from malnutrition; the mother was sent with child to hospital at once. A supply of food and clothes was also sent and later the family moved to a more desirable location. The father died of pneumonia and the mother	
girl, who was found by the secretary and application made at the Alexander Milne Home, Kenner, La., and she being due clothing was furnished for entrance. She was accompanied down there by the secretary and placed in the Home where she will be taught to read and write, and the art of basket making, etc.	
This girl is sixteen years old and was raised in an asylum in New Orleans. Owing to the fact that she was feeble minded, her education was very much neglected. She has a half sister who is also feeble minded, and her application has been accepted in the Home, but her stepfather refuses to let her go. He abuses her and her mother also.	
We have made every effort to get this child away from there, and so far have been unsuccessful. She also has a cousin who is feeble minded and whom we are now interested in and are trying to get into the Home, so when she is 18 years old she can leave there.



M. Laval, D. D., issues the following invitation: "You are cordially invited to attend the dedication ceremonies of St. Catharine's Church at Madisonville, La., on the seventh of Novem-

ber, nineteen hundred and twenty, at eight o'clock a. m." The altar is beautifully finished in white and gilt and all interior finishings are in hard oil. The support columns are massive and highly polished and are inlaid below the handsome arches of the roof. There is an ample choir gallery above the church entrance and the seats are so arranged that children will be seated. All the material in the church is

A SUMMARY OF WORK DONE BY R. C. PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

Medical and Surgical Attention Changes Aspect of Child Life.

HEALTH IN PLACE OF SICKNESS, DEATH

Money Spent for Health and the Building of Sound Future Citizenship

February—This month, beginning with the ninth, was partly taken up with meetings and interviews, with talks with the people in general, getting acquainted, and giving the people an idea of what the work was to be. Met with the Nursing Committee, the Home Service Committee. Had talks with Supt. Lyon, of the parish schools, with the Supervisors of Elementary Schools, with the editor, dentists, and others.

Met the Women's Progressive Union, in the interest of a Rest Room. Visited the schools at Madisonville, Waldheim, Ramsay and Folsom. Assisted with the vaccination of children in the Folsom school and inspected 81 of the other children there.
