


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ONE OF RED CROSS TENTS THAT SERVED PUBLIC AT PARISH FAIR

SUMMARY OF WORK DONE BY PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE.

visits, 26; prenatal visits, 1; tuberculosis visits, 4; other visits, 22; total, 57.

March—The influenza was very prevalent during this month, and I had 20 cases of it. Some were very severe cases, and were visited quite often. Nurses were procured for six families, and one man, who had pneumonia, was sent to the hospital in New Orleans. One family was supplied with linen from our loan closet. On the 19th visited two cases in Folsom, and while there visited the school, talking to the teachers about the Health Posters, and to the children on care of the teeth. Also had a talk with the Mayor, who told of two neglected children. Reported case to Home Secretary and Probation Officer.

On the 17th visited Middle Road and Pilgrim Rest schools. Inspected all of the children and gave talks to classes.

The 22d and 23d were spent in Mandeville, where I assisted Dr. Paine in examination of 110 children in school. Met with the Mandeville School Improvement League. Asked Supt. Lyon to send vaccine to Dr. Paine, who vaccinated all unvaccinated children in the Mandeville and Lewisburg schools. There was at the time a case of small-pox near Lewisburg, and a number of cases in New Orleans.

Reported the case of a feeble-minded child, in the Mandeville school, to Home Service Secretary, for application for admission to the Alexander Milne Home.

On the 26th visited schools at Oak Grove and Sun, examining all children there.

29th and 30 assisted Drs. Polk, Griffith and Singleton in examination of Slidell school children.

Number of schools visited 13, children examined 768, medical corrections 7, dental corrections 2, talks

to pupils in class 26, total number cases for month 36, nursing visits 90, prenatal visits 1, tuberculosis visits 3, home visits to school children 8, other visits 6. Total 121.

April—The influenza had abated, so most of the time was spent in the schools, the term nearing its end. On the 5th went to Slidell and assisted Dr. Griffith in finishing the

examination of the school. Met with some of the ladies who were getting ready for the opening of the Community House. Also met with the Priscilla Club.

On the 9th, by invitation of Supt. Lyon, met the School Board to tell them something of the conditions found in the schools, and ask for (Continued on page 2.)
