





HEINTZ TELLS OF IMPROVEMENTS IN STATE LAWS.

 will be the most important measure before the Convention, and what have you to offer in the way of improvement?
 "That is rather a premature ques-

tion Discussion may bring out many things of supreme importance that are not being talked of now. However, there are some things regarding which I have formed what I believe to be well founded conclusions.
 "I believe the Constitution of our state should be brief and simple. I go further, in fact, it ought to be such a document that every lay mind would understand its simple brief wording.
 "I do not believe that any statute law should be embodied in the Constitution. The Legislature should be given the responsibility of carrying out the intent of the Constitution, by acts that are almost as simple and brief as the Constitution itself. For instance, take Article 233 of the present Constitution, dealing with

the sale of property for non-payment of taxes. This article contains forty-eight lines with an average of twelve words to a line. The more you read this Article, as is the case with Shakespearean works and the Bible, you can find more in it. In my opinion the present Article could be substituted by the following:
 "Article 233—There shall be no forfeiture of property for non-payment of taxes. The State, Parishes and Municipalities, through their proper officials, shall have the right to sell assessed property for non-payment of taxes. The Legislature shall pass acts regulating the terms, stipulations and conditions of all tax sales."

"I believe, also, that each Act of the Legislature should stand on its own merit. We should have no Act amending and re-enacting an Act that is amended and re-enacted by an Act amending and re-enacting, etc. This would very much simplify matters.
 "Personally, I will exert whatever efforts I can towards writing into the Constitution an Article that will exempt from taxes for a period of ten years from and after 1925 all new lands that are cleared and put into cultivation between June, 1924 and June, 1925, together with all farm implements, horses and mules, etc., used in such cultivation. Leaving it, of course, to the Legislature to pass an Act in the 1922 session regulating this exemption.
 "Such a Constitution would certainly throw a heavier measure of responsibility upon the Legislature. The people of the state as a whole should be made to feel and know that the office of Parish Representative is one that calls for the highest degree of public trust and that only the best type of men should be sent to the state law-making body."

MARSHAL JONES SHOT.

 knocked Jones down, afterwards retreating to his automobile near by and warning Jones, who had got not to come near to him. When Jones continued to advance he reached into the car and got the gun. Three shots were fired with deliberation, a pause being made after each shot. It is said Jones stood so still while these three shots were fired that witnesses thought the pistol contained blank cartridges. After the third shot Jones reeled slightly and turned partly around. It was then that the fourth shot, which is said to have entered his back, was fired. This is understood to be the bullet that is still in the lungs.
 During the excitement following Trenchard was taken away. Jones went back to the Warren billiard rooms and got the gun he had left there, intending to find Trenchard and get satisfaction. Friends held him and took the gun from his hand. It was seen that his strength was fast ebbing away and that he would not be able to stand much longer. It was then that he was taken to Dr. Bulloch. In a few moments he was lying on a stretcher. The deadly pallor of his face and the number of wounds he had received impressed those who saw him that he was fatally hurt.
 Marshal Jones was shot once before, it is said, while making an arrest. He was also quite painfully injured by the explosion of gas in a tank, when he was blown through a roof. He was a man who was afraid of nothing and was considered one of the best fire-fighters in the Firemen's Association. He was but recently presented with a purse of money for his daring fight against the fire that destroyed the Echo building and several adjoining buildings. The work of himself and several companions saved the Southern hotel from destruction at that time. He has always made a fine showing of courage and ability as a fire-fighter.
