TRAFFIC RULES ON NEW HAMPSHIRE STREET.


Marshal Schultz has been carrying out instructions as to parking cars in New Hampshire street in the postoffice block.

The town ordinance, we understand, is to be enforced and all cars must be parked at an angle of 45 degrees on the courthouse side of the street.


LENTEEN SERVICES AT ABITA SPRINGS.
