AN ORDINANCE

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Mandeville, That a license tax is hereby levied for the year 1921 upon all corporations, firms, persons, etc., carrying on or pursuing a trade, occupation or business or calling within the limits of the Town of Mandeville, which is subject to a State license.

AN ORDINANCE

Section 2. Be it further ordained, That the license tax for the year 1920 shall be and is hereby fixed as follows, to-wit:
1. For every business of selling merchandise at retail, whether as principal, agent or on commission, the license shall be as follows:
When the gross annual sales are \$25,000.00, or more, the license shall be \$30.00; when the gross annual sales are more than \$50,000.00, or

more, the license shall be \$20.00; when the gross annual sales are \$15,000.00, or more, the license shall be \$15.00; when the gross annual sales are \$5,000.00, or less, the license shall be \$10.00.

2. For every individual, firm, association or corporation engaged in the sale at retail of distilled, spirituous, vinous or malt, or other liquors or beverages containing any alcoholic contents, shall pay an annual license tax of \$25.00.

3. For every individual, firm, association or corporation carrying on the profession or business of draying or keeping carriages, hacks, or horses for hire, shall pay an annual license tax of \$5.00.

4. For every individual, firm, association or corporation carrying on the profession or business of keeping motor vehicles for hire shall pay an annual license tax of \$15.00.

5. For every individual, firm, association or corporation carrying on the profession or business of keeping billiard tables, pigeon hole, shooting gallery, shall pay an annual license tax of \$10.00 for each table or shooting gallery.

6. For every individual, firm, association or corporation carrying on the profession or business of undertaking and funeral director, shall pay an annual license tax of \$12.00.

7. For every individual, firm, association or corporation engaged in the business of making soda water, ice cream, confections and other similar soft drinks or refreshments, shall pay an annual license tax of \$10.00.

8. For every individual, firm, association or corporation carrying on the business of restaurant or eating-house, whether attached to or conducted separate and apart from a hotel, boarding house or rooming house, shall pay an annual license tax of \$5.00.

9. For every individual, firm, association or corporation carrying on the business of keeping a hotel when the number of rooms is 12 or more, and less than 15, shall pay an annual license tax of \$30.00.

10. For every individual, firm, association or corporation carrying on the business of keeping a hotel when the number of rooms is 6 or more, and less than 10, shall pay an annual license tax of \$20.00.

11. For each and every peddler and hawk other than vendors of ice, poultry, eggs, vegetables and fruits, the license shall be as follows: When traveling on foot, \$30.00; when traveling in vehicle, \$50.00.

12. For each and every peddler of poultry, eggs, vegetables and fruits shall pay an annual license tax of \$5.00.

13. For every individual, firm, association or corporation carrying on the business of keeping a theatre or exhibition of moving pictures, shall pay an annual license tax of \$25.00.

14. For every individual, firm, association or corporation carrying on the business of electric lights, telegraphing, telephoning or express, shall pay an annual license tax of \$25.00.

15. For every individual, firm, association or corporation carrying on the business of keeping a garage or automobile repair shop shall pay an annual license tax of \$10.00.

16. For every individual, firm, association or corporation carrying on the business or profession of physician, osteopathy, dentist, jeweler, or any other business not herein provided for, shall pay an annual license tax of \$5.00.

17. For every automobile, car or truck the owner thereof shall pay an annual license tax of \$4.00.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That all ordinances or parts of ordinances contrary to or inconsistent with this ordinance, are hereby repealed.
