ORDINANCE NO. 80. An ordinance to define "Intoxicating Liquor"; to prohibit the manufacture, sale, transportation or possession thereof; to provide for search and seizure, and to fix penalties for the violation of this ordinance. Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council, That the term "Intoxicating Liquor" as used herein shall be construed to include alcohol, whisky, brandy, rum, gin, beer, ale, porter, wine, or whatever named known or called, containing one-half of one per cent or more of alcohol by volume; and in addition thereto the term "Intoxicating Liquor" shall also include any alcoholic concoction, preparation or compound, whether medicated, proprietary, patented or not, containing one-half of one per cent or more of alcohol by volume, when manufactured, sold, transported or possessed for beverage purposes.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That the manufacture, sale, transportation or possession of intoxicating liquor is hereby prohibited in the limits of the Town of Covington; except this ordinance is not meant to prohibit the enjoyment of a bona fide United States Government permit, nor to prohibit acts authorized by the Act of Congress commonly known as the "National Prohibition Act" or the regulations issued thereunder.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That any place suspected of being used or conducted for the manufacture, sale, transportation or possession of intoxicating liquor is subject to search by a proper officer upon warrant issued by the Mayor's Court, by any other court or officer having the power of a committing magistrate. The affidavit and warrant shall follow the same formalities required in such proceedings under the state law. The officer making the search shall seize all intoxicating liquors as defined in this act.

all paraphernalia, etc., found on or about the premises and shall arrest and bring before the court all persons found therein and all those responsible for the operation of such place, including the owners, operators, tenants, employees, watchers, etc. The officer to whom the search warrant is issued shall make the usual returns thereon within thirty-six hours after it is issued. Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That any person found guilty of violating this ordinance shall for the first offense be fined not less than fifty (\$50) dollars and be imprisoned not less than ten days; and for the second or subsequent offense shall be fined not less than one hundred (\$100) dollars and be imprisoned not less than thirty (30) days. Section 5. Be it further ordained, etc., That all ordinances or parts thereof inconsistent with the provisions hereof are hereby repealed. Upon a vote being taken the following voted yeas: H. A. MANDEVILLE COUNCIL. AN ORDINANCE. Levying a tax of two dollars (\$2) on each male inhabitant of the Town of Mandeville, La., between the ages of eighteen (18) and fifty-five (55) years, for the purpose of working and improving the streets of the town.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Mandeville, La., in legal session convened, That there is hereby levied on all male inhabitants of the Town of Mandeville, La., between the ages of eighteen (18) and fifty-five (55) years of age, a per capita tax of two (\$2) dollars for the year 1921 for the purpose of working and improving the streets of the said Town of Mandeville, La.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, That the per capita tax levied in Section 1 of this ordinance shall be dug and collectible within ten days after notice given, and that any person refusing to pay said tax, or working three days on the streets of the said town of Mandeville, shall upon conviction before the Mayor, be sentenced to pay a fine of not more than twenty-five dollars or to serve a term of not more than thirty days in the town jail, or both fine and imprisonment, at the discretion of the Mayor.





BAPTISTS REPORT GAIN IN NUMBERS. IN LAST 14 YEARS THEY HAVE ADDED OVER MILLION MEMBERS IN SOUTH. WILL MEET IN CHATTANOOGA. Next Meeting Important. The approaching session of the Convention is regarded as vitally important to the future of the denomination's work. It is hoped that by the Convention two-fifths of all subscriptions to the 75 Million Campaign will have been paid in cash and that the program for the completion of the remainder of the campaign task can be formulated at this time. Dr. J. B. Gambrell, president of the Convention, and Dr. E. Y. Mullins, who recently completed a tour of Europe, where they carried fraternal greetings to the Baptists of that continent, will give their impressions of Baptist opportunity in that country, while Dr. George W. Truett and Dr. J. E. Love, who represented the Foreign Mission Board at the London Conference last summer when the mission fields of Europe were considered, will tell of the new territory of Spain, Yugoslavia, Hungary, Roumania and Southern Russia, which Southern Baptists are asked to occupy. This territory is as large as the Southern States and has a population of 128,000,000. All the boards of the Convention will report the largest year's accomplishments in their history, the Home Mission Board being scheduled to report the completion of its million dollar loan fund for church building, in addition to the aiding of a thousand churches during the year with gifts and loans for the erection of new houses of worship. The Sunday School Board will report more than 4,000,000 in sales for the year and with collections as well as sales better than any previous time in its history.
