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

SCHOOL BOARD.

(Continued from page 1)
The reports of the Superintendent and Elementary School Supervisor were read, and upon motion by Mr. Levy, seconded by Mr. Oswald, they were approved and ordered spread upon the minutes. The Superintendent's report included the following from Mr. A. M. Hopper, assistant rural supervisor, who inspected certain of the schools recently:
Baton Rouge, March 19, 1921. Superintendent T. H. Harris, Baton Rouge, Louisiana.
Dear Sir:—Recently I visited the following schools in St. Tammany parish: Abita Springs, Sun, Oak Grove, Madisonville, Onward, Talisheek, Central, Audubon, Pearl River and Sand Hill. I beg to report as follows:
Abita Springs. This is a four teacher school. The town hall serves as the school build-

ing. The arrangement of the building is not well adapted for school purposes. Three of the rooms are on the upper floor and only one of these has an outside entrance. As the building was not planned for school purposes the arrangement of the rooms is inconvenient and the lighting in two of the rooms is very poor. These rooms are wide and the light comes from two windows on each side. There are no window shades. It would be very difficult to do first class work in this building.
Madisonville. This is a six teacher school. The building is comparatively new and is well arranged for school purposes. The building needs painting as the inside has never been painted and the outside should be repainted. The building is well equipped for school purposes and is well kept. The work here is well organized, each teacher having about the same number of

pupils. All the work that we saw in this school was satisfactory. Some of it was very good. The teacher was very enthusiastic and her enthusiasm was reflected by every child in the school. This was all the more noticeable as we seldom see a situation like this in a one room school.

Pearl River. This is a three room school. The building originally had only two rooms.

Sand Hill. This is a one room school. The school is now using a new building although it is far from complete. When it is complete it will be a very good one room building. The community is small having only about twenty-five children of school age. The work that we saw in this school room was satisfactory. This year a third room has been added. This room has not been painted. The old part of the building has never been painted inside. Sun, Talisheek, Audubon, Oak Grove and Onward. This is a four teacher school. The building is satisfactory but shows a lack of proper care. Audubon and Talisheek are three teacher schools. The buildings are new and in good condition. Oak Grove and Onward are two teacher schools. The buildings are in good condition.

The parish has had a supervisor since the beginning of last year and her work was reflected in every school, especially in the primary grades. The teachers showed that their work had been carefully planned and preparation was evident in nearly every instance. The qualifications of the teachers as a whole were not as good as we have seen in other parishes. Many of them have had little or no professional training and I understand that the parish is now using about thirty emergency teachers. We did, however, see many good teachers and some excellent teaching. Most of our time was spent in observing and conducting recitations, and in discussing the classroom work with the teachers and supervisor.

In some of the schools the pupils are not well distributed among the teachers. The Talisheek school had fifty-four pupils present at the time of my visit. They were distributed as follows: Lower grades, twenty-nine pupils; middle grades, eighteen pupils; upper grades, seven. The teacher of the upper grades also sent two classes into the primary room for recitations. By computing the amount of the teachers' time that is given to each pupil, I find that in the upper grades each child gets 49 minutes while in the primary grades each child gets 8 minutes. I feel that every effort should be made to make the division of time more in favor of the primary children. These children do not know how to study, and practically all that they learn is obtained from the recitations. The condition stated above is not confined to this school but is found in many of the schools of the state.

The Executive Committee presented the following report:

Gentlemen:—We, the Executive Committee, met in the office of the Superintendent on the night of the above date and examined and approved bills to the amount of \$952.03.

Moved by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Levy, that the Superintendent purchase roofing paint and have it placed upon all the roofs of school houses where needed.

The Superintendent reported that the plans and specifications were now ready for the parish training school for negroes to be built in Slidell. Moved by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Keller, that a building committee be appointed to receive bids and award contract for the erection of this training school, with authority to advertise for sale the present Slidell school house for negro children.

Carried. The president appointed the Ninth Ward School Director, the Superintendent and Mr. F. F. Wigginton, of Slidell.

Moved by Mr. Levy, seconded by Mr. Talley, that the Elementary School Supervisor be engaged for a third year, beginning July 1, 1921 at a salary of \$1500, to be paid in twelve equal monthly payments.

Carried. Moved by Mr. O'Keefe, seconded by Mr. Oswald, that a two-room school house be built on the site of the former Savannah Branch school house, and that the plan prepared by Mr. Charles Jenkins be adopted.

The business arrangements were left to the same building committee that had charge of the one-room addition to the school house burned April 4.

At twelve o'clock, upon motion duly seconded, it was voted to adjourn until one-thirty.

At one-thirty the meeting was called to order with the same members present as in the morning session with the addition of Mr. Geo. R. Dutsch, of the first ward, and Mr. Geo. F. Bancks, of the eighth ward.

Moved by Mr. Dutsch, seconded by Mr. Oswald, that the salaries for principals of the high schools shall hereafter be as follows: \$1500 for high school of no more than six teachers. \$150 should be added to this amount for each additional teacher up to fourteen and after that it shall be \$2790. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Oswald, seconded by Mr. Levy, that the meeting stand adjourned, subject to call.

Party of the first part further agrees to have printed on the face of all statements a schedule of rates, as well as the discounts hereinabove provided.

Party of the first part further stipulates and agrees to repair in a workmanlike manner all damages caused by the installation of the electric poles along the sidewalks, and to maintain such poles, wires and other equipment, etc., in good condition in reference to civic improvement and public safety. All wires to be tautly strung.

It is further understood and agreed by the parties hereto that this contract shall remain in full force and effect for a period of five (5) years, commencing from the 1st day of April, A. D., 1921.

Party of the second part hereby contracts, agrees, covenants and stipulates to pay to party of the first part for street electric service, as above described, on the 6th day of each month out of and from the general fund of the Town of Covington.

Party of the second part further contracts to dedicate and does hereby formally dedicate to the payment of the bills of the party of the first part, to be incurred under the terms of this contract, the general revenues of the Town, or so much thereof as may be necessary to meet and pay such obligations.

Mackie, Emile Frederlek, R. W. Badon, M. P. Planche not voting on account of interest in said company.

Be it ordained by the Town Council in legal session convened, That Robert W. Badon, Mayor of the Town of Covington, be and is hereby authorized and empowered to enter into a contract with the St. Tammany Ice and Manufacturing Company upon the following terms, to-wit:

1. St. Tammany Ice & Mfg. Co. shall furnish to the Town of Covington, for the price and sum of Three Hundred and Sixty-Eight Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$368.50) per month the following street lights: Fifteen (15) 300 watt lamps, Forty (40) 250 watt lamps, and Sixty (60) 100 watt lamps.
2. St. Tammany Ice & Mfg. Co. shall furnish any additional street lights the duly constituted authorities of the Town may elect to install at the following rates: 300 watt lamps at \$7.50 per month, 250 watt lamps at \$6.25 per month, and 100 watt lamps at \$2.50 per month, or in other words \$0.7 1/2 per k. w. per month.

3. St. Tammany Ice & Mfg. Co. shall immediately replace all street lights upon their failure to develop the full amount of wattage, for which charge is made.

4. St. Tammany Ice & Mfg. Co. shall furnish, without cost or compensation, lights for the municipal offices and fire-house, however, with the understanding that globes and fixtures are to be furnished by the municipality.

5. St. Tammany Ice & Mfg. Co. shall furnish electricity for the illumination of the Public School house at a rate of \$2.00 per month when the said school house is being used exclusively for school purposes.

6. St. Tammany Ice & Mfg. Co. shall keep all lights burning from sun-down to sun-up, at all times.

7. St. Tammany Ice & Mfg. Co. shall keep continuous current for commercial consumption during the twenty-four hours of each day, except and save when necessary and imperative repairs are being made to its machinery.

8. St. Tammany Ice & Mfg. Co. shall blow the fire whistle when a fire alarm is turned in, without cost or compensation.

9. St. Tammany Ice & Mfg. Co. shall furnish lights and electric service to all consumers in the Town of Covington and to charge therefor a sum not to exceed the following rates:
First 25 k. w. 17 1/2 c.
Next 100 k. w. 15 c.
Next 100 k. w. 14 c.
Next 100 k. w. 13 c.
Next 100 k. w. 12 1/2 c.

Less discount of 5 per cent on bills, if paid on or before the 6th of each month, up to \$7.99; less 10 per cent on bills from \$8.00 to \$11.99; less 12 per cent on all bills over \$12.00.

10. St. Tammany Ice & Mfg. Co. shall furnish power to all consumers in the Town of Covington and to charge therefor a sum not to exceed the following rates:
50 k. w. 12 1/2 c.
Next 100 k. w. 10 c.
Next 100 k. w. 8 1/2 c.
Next 100 k. w. 7 1/2 c.

Anything lower, rates on application.
Such rate is not to apply to anything under three-horse-power motor, or other words, a minimum of \$3.00.

11. St. Tammany Ice & Mfg. Co. shall allow on all bills paid on or before the 6th day of each month a discount of 5 per cent, on power rates.

Monthly minimum—Home Consumers, meter service, \$1.50
Monthly minimum—Business Consumers, meter service, \$2.00.

12. St. Tammany Ice & Mfg. Co. shall permit the Town of Covington to change the style of reflectors and brackets on street lights at any time, provided that the party of the second part (Town of Covington) shall pay for the substituted reflectors and brackets, with the understanding, however, that Town of Covington shall be given credit for the estimated value of the old reflectors and brackets.

13. St. Tammany Ice & Mfg. Co. shall make no charge for installation of meters.


