

On motion duly seconded, the following ordinance was unanimously adopted:

AN ORDINANCE ordering a special election in the Town of Mandeville, Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the Town of Mandeville the question of a bond issue of \$32,000, the proceeds of said bond issue to be used to make certain improvements within the limits of said town.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Mandeville, in lawful session convened, that an election shall be, and is hereby called to be held in the Town of Mandeville, Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, on the 25th day of May, 1921, at which election a majority of the taxpayers of the said Town, in number and amount, eligible to vote and voting, shall determine the:

Proposition to incur debt and issue bonds for the said Town of Mandeville, Louisiana, in the amount of \$32,000, and to run for a period of twenty-five years, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, the funds thus derived to be used for the following purposes:

1. To dredge a channel through the ravine in Square No. 27.
2. To repair, improve and hard-surface streets.
3. To repair, improve and hard-surface streets.

In said election in the following form, to-wit:

Special election to be held in the Town of Mandeville, Louisiana, on May 25, 1921, pursuant to an ordinance adopted by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, as the governing authority of said town, on the 22d day of April, 1921.

Proposition to incur debt and issue bonds for the said Town of Mandeville, Louisiana, in the amount of \$32,000, and to run for a period of twenty-five years, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, for the following purposes: To dredge a channel through the ravine in Square No. 27, and to repair, improve and hard-surface streets.

The Secretary of the Town Council is also directed to have prepared and to distribute to Commissioners appointed to hold said special election all necessary ballot boxes, lists of taxpayers entitled to vote either in person or by proxy at said special election, together with the valuation of property of each as shown by the

last assessment approved and filed, and all necessary lists of voters, tally sheets and compiled statements.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that the polling place of said election shall be at Mandeville, Louisiana, at the regular polling booth provided by law.

The polls shall be open at seven o'clock a. m., and close at five o'clock p. m., and the following three commissioners and clerk are appointed to serve at the said election:

Be it further ordained, etc., that the Mayor of said Town of Mandeville, Louisiana, is hereby directed to give notice of the special election hereby ordered to be held by his proclamation to be published according to law, and in said proclamation he shall announce that at eleven o'clock a. m. on May 26, 1921, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the said Town, of Mandeville, will meet at its usual meeting place in the Town Hall in the Town of Mandeville, in public session will open the ballot boxes, examine and canvass the result and declare the result of said election and promulgate the same.

On roll call the members of the Town Council of the Town of Mandeville, Louisiana, voted as follows: Yes: Dr. W. E. Van Zandt, Jas. Band, Edmund Baudot, Steve J. Jozz, W. A. Griffin, W. R. Smith. Nay: None.

On motion duly second the following ordinance was unanimously adopted:

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Mandeville, in legal session convened, that W. E. Van Zandt, W. A. Griffin, Jas. Band, Edmund Baudot, Steve Jozz, W. R. Smith, H. H. Levy, Ernest Prieto, C. A. David, A. Depra, D. J. Mulligan, shall constitute the Supervising Board, who shall have power and authority, after tax mentioned in the foregoing ordinance is voted, to provide the specifications of such improvements, to call for bids, to let the contract or contracts for the work designated therein, and supervise the construction of the same.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that the said Supervisors shall be the agents of the Town Council in all matters pertaining to the construction of the improvements pro-

and canvass the returns and declare the result of the election and promulgate the same."

AN ORDINANCE.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, La., That a special election be and the same is hereby called to be held in the Fourth Ward of the Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, on the 25th day of May, 1921, at which shall be submitted the following proposition, to-wit:

To incur debt and issue bonds therefor to be used for the improvement of the Fourth Ward of the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, in the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand (\$25,000) Dollars, to run 20 years from date and to bear interest at the rate of five per centum per annum from date until paid, payable annually or semi-annually, to dig a channel at the mouth of Bayou Castling; to construct a revetment for the protection of said channel; to build wharves and make all necessary and proper improvements along said Bayou, in order to make said Bayou sufficient in size to receive and accommodate barges, schooners, motor boats and every other kind of vessel.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That the Secretary of the Police Jury be and he is hereby authorized and directed to have prepared for use at the said election a sufficient number of ballots, on each of which shall be printed the proposition above set forth and in substantially the following form:

Ballot.
Special election to be held in the Fourth Ward of the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, on May 25, 1921, pursuant to an ordinance ordering same, adopted by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany as the governing authority of said Fourth Ward, on the 12th day of April, 1921.

Proposition to incur debt and issue bonds therefor in behalf of the Fourth Ward of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, in the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars, to run twenty years from date and to bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, to dig a channel at the mouth of Bayou Castling; to construct a revetment for the protection of said channel; to build wharves and make all necessary and proper improvements along the said Bayou, in order to make said Bayou sufficient in size to receive and accommodate barges, schooners, motor boats and every other kind of vessel.

Clerks, Paul Esquinance and C. A. David; commissioners, W. G. Davis, Lucas Prieto, Geo. Smith, each being a registered voter.

The polls shall open at 7 o'clock a. m. and close at 5 o'clock p. m., and said election duly qualified taxpayers may vote.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That the President of the Police Jury, as the governing authority of the Fourth Ward, Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, is hereby directed to give notice of the special election hereby ordered to be held by his proclamation to be published according to law, and in said proclamation he shall announce that at 11 o'clock a. m., on May 26, 1921, the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, as the governing authority of the Fourth Ward, will meet at its usual meeting place at the courthouse in the Town of Covington, and will, in open session, proceed to open the ballot boxes used at said special election, count the ballots in each, and make and announce the returns of said special election and declare the results thereof.

MANDEVILLE COUNCIL.

AN ORDINANCE
Levy a tax of two dollars (\$2) on each male inhabitant of the Town of Mandeville, La., between the ages of eighteen (18) and fifty-five (55) years, for the purpose of working and improving the streets of the town.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Mandeville, La., in legal session convened, that there is hereby levied on all male inhabitants of the Town of Mandeville, La., between the ages of eighteen (18) and fifty-five (55) years of age, a per capita tax of two (\$2) dollars for the year 1921 for the purpose of working and improving the streets of the said Town of Mandeville, La.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, that the per capita tax levied in Section 1 of this ordinance shall be due and collectable within ten days after notice given, and that any person refusing to pay said tax, or working three days on the streets of the said Town of Mandeville, shall upon conviction before the Mayor, be sentenced to pay a fine of not more than twenty-five dollars or to serve a term of not more than thirty days in the town jail, or both fine and imprisonment, at the discretion of the Mayor.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, that this ordinance shall go into effect immediately after its promulgation.
