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CHARTER OF THE ATLANTIC AND GULF NAVAL STORES COMPANY, INC.

United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany.

Personally came and appeared the parties whose names are hereinafter subscribed, all of full age, who declare that, availing themselves of the provisions of the laws of the State of Louisiana, relatives to corporations, they have covenanted and agreed, and by these presents covenant and agree and bind themselves, as well as such other persons as may hereafter become associated with them, to join and constitute a corporation and may make in law, for the purposes and objects, and under the provisions, articles and conditions following, to-wit:

The name and title of said corporation shall be "Atlantic and Gulf Naval Stores Company, Incorporated," and its domicile is hereby established at Covington, State of Louisiana; and under its corporate name the said corporation shall have power and authority to contract, sue and be sued; to make and use a corporate seal and, the same to break and alter at pleasure.

Said corporation, unless sooner dissolved in accordance with the stipulations of this charter, shall exist and continue to have succession for a period of ninety-nine (99) years from date hereof.

The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized, and carried on by it, are declared to be the following, to-wit:

To buy and sell, for the purpose of export and otherwise, and generally to deal in naval stores, turpentine, rosin, resin oil, crude gum, tar, batting-dross, and all other naval stores products, and lubricating, lighting, fuel and food oils, and for this purpose to own, lease, operate and maintain stores, storehouses, yards and warehouses; and, in aid of its business operations, may own, lease, operate and maintain tanks, cars, railroads, wharves, tramways, landings, steamboats and other water-craft, and when necessary or incidental in the course of its business, may acquire, own, lease, sell and dispose of all kinds of real estate; and may loan and borrow money and secure the same by mortgage, pledge or other security; and do a general mercantile business, and manufacture turpentine and rosin and all other products that may be extracted from pine timber; to buy and sell lumber and timber of all kinds for export and otherwise; to operate saw mills, planing mills, etc., for the purpose of manufacturing lumber and other products from pine or hardwood timber; to appoint managers, officers, agents and employees in the State of Louisiana and other states and foreign countries, as its interests may require; to do and perform all other things requisite, necessary or convenient to enable it to carry out the objects and purposes above set forth.

ARTICLE III.
The capital stock of said corporation shall be Fifty Thousand (\$50,000) Dollars, divided into and represented by five hundred (500) shares of the par value of One Hundred (\$100) Dollars each, which said stock may be paid for in cash, or the same may be issued at not less than par in payment or exchange for property or rights actually received or purchased by said corporation, or the same may be issued, full paid, for money advanced, and for such other valuable consideration or services as the Board of Directors of said corporation may determine.

The capital stock of said corporation may be increased to a sum not to exceed Two Hundred and Fifty Thousand (\$250,000) Dollars, at the pleasure of the Board of Directors, in which event, during the period between the call of the meeting for the purpose of increasing the capital stock and the meeting, the persons holding stock at the time shall have the right to take shares of the additional or increased stock proportionate to the number of shares owned by them, and any shares not taken at the expiration of such period may be disposed of by the Board of Directors for the benefit of the stockholders at not less than par value.

Any stockholder may sell, assign or transfer his stock in this corporation, provided thirty (30) days prior notice of such intention to sell, assign or transfer the same be given to the company, and the other stockholders thereof shall have first privilege of purchasing same after which thirty (30) days in open market.

The capital stock of this corporation shall be non-assessable, and may be transferred under the above conditions, provided such transfer thereto be made on the books of said company at its office at Covington, Louisiana, and on surrendering the certificate therefor. No transfer of any fractional part of a share shall be made.

This corporation shall be authorized to commence doing business as soon as Fifty Thousand (\$50,000) Dollars of the capital stock shall have been subscribed for. The stock subscribed for shall be paid upon call of the Board of Directors in such amounts and at such times as the said Board shall prescribe, with at least ten days' notice in writing to the subscribers.

ARTICLE IV.
The corporate powers of this corporation shall be vested in its Board of Directors, to be composed of not less than three nor more than eight, but may be fixed within those limits, all of whom shall be stockholders of this corporation. Said Board of Directors shall be elected annually by the stockholders on the first Tuesday of July in each and every year, when annual meeting of the stockholders shall be held at the office of the company in Covington, Louisiana, or which meeting notice shall be given at least fifteen (15) days' continuous publication immediately preceding such election in a paper published in the Town of Covington, Louisiana, or by ten (10) days' written notice to each stockholder. The first election hereunder shall be held on the first Tuesday of July, 1922, until which time the following persons shall be and constitute the Board of Directors of this company, to-wit: John F. Rausch, A. E. Lucas, W. C. Rhodes, H. A. Black. Any vacancy occurring in the Board of Directors during its term of office shall be filled by election by the remaining members of the board.

A majority of the members of the board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business and their decisions shall be valid corporate acts.

At the annual meeting of the Board of Directors to be held on the first Tuesday of July, 1922, and annually thereafter, the said Board shall elect from among its number a president, a vice-president, who may also be secretary of said corporation, a treasurer and such other officers as may be necessary, and the said officers shall hold office for one year, or until their successors are elected. Until the first election the following are declared to be the officers of this corporation, to-wit: John F. Rausch, president; A. E. Lucas, vice-president and secretary; and W. C. Rhodes, treasurer.

Any failure from any cause whatever to elect directors on the date named for that purpose shall not dissolve this corporation, but the directors then in office, as well as the officers of this company, shall hold over until their successors are chosen. In such event the president shall cause another election to be held in thirty (30) days, and shall give notice thereof as above provided.

During the absence of the president the vice-president shall act and preside.

At every election and meeting each stockholder shall be entitled to one vote for each share of stock registered in his name, and may vote by proxy. The election of directors shall be by ballot, and a majority in amount of votes cast, each share of stock voted upon to be counted for one vote, shall elect the person or persons for whom they have been cast.

ARTICLE V.
It shall be lawful for the stockholders of this corporation, at a general meeting convened for that purpose, to make any modifications, additions or changes in this act of incorporation or to dissolve it with the assent of three-fourths of the stock represented at such meetings. Notice of such meeting shall be given as prescribed in Article IV hereof for the election of directors.

ARTICLE VI.
No stockholder of this corporation shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts or faults thereof in any further sum than the unpaid balance due the company on the shares of stock subscribed for or owned by him, or shall any intangible in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null or of exposing a stockholder to a liability beyond the unpaid balance if any, of his stock.

ARTICLE VII.
In case of dissolution or termination of this corporation, either by limitation of its charter or from any other cause, the liquidation of its affairs shall be conducted by three (3) liquidators selected from the stockholders of the corporation, or by the majority of the votes cast at a meeting called for that purpose after notice shall have been given as provided in Article IV hereof for the election of directors. Said liquidators shall remain in office until the affairs of said corporation have been fully liquidated. In case of the death of one or more of the liquidators, the survivor or survivors shall continue to act.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Covington, La., in regular session convened, That the regular biennial municipal election is hereby called and ordered to be held at the courthouse on Boston Street, in Covington, La., on Tuesday, June 21, 1921, between the hours of 8:00 o'clock a. m., and 7:00 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of electing one Mayor, six Aldermen, one Day Marshal and one Night Marshal.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That any person desiring to become a candidate in said election for the office of Mayor, Alderman, Day Marshal or Night Marshal, shall on or before the 17th day of May, 1921, at 12:00 o'clock m., file a written declaration of his candidacy with the Town Clerk at the Town Hall or Mayor's Office, on Boston Street, which declaration and notification shall set forth the fact that he is a citizen of the Town of Covington, and is a duly qualified elector under the constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana, and under the charter of the Town of Covington, Louisiana.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That due public notice be given of the calling of this election, the ordering and holding thereof, and the Mayor of the Town of Covington, La., is hereby authorized and instructed to give such notice of the same by inserting such in the St. Tammany Farmer, official journal of the Town, in which shall be stated the time, place and manner and purpose of said election, and which shall be published for the period required by law.

Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That the Town Council shall meet on the 23d day of May, 1921, at 3:00 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of selecting and appointing commissioners and clerks of election, who shall conduct the same in accordance with the provisions of the charter of Covington, and the general election laws, in so far as they are applicable.

Section 5. Be it further ordained, etc., That the returns of said election shall be made to the Town Council and Mayor, and in accordance with law, and that the result thereof be promulgated according to law.

Section 6. Be it further ordained, etc., That this ordinance shall take


