



COURT PROCEEDINGS.

District Court was in session on this week; Judge Carter on the bench and District Attorney J. Vol Brock prosecuting. The following cases were disposed of:

Succession of Robt. C. Perkins. Judgment rendered homologating the provisional account.

Succession of Balche C. Warner. Judgment rendered homologating final account and discharging tutor. Succession of J. D. Grant. Judgment rendered in favor of State of Louisiana and against succession in the sum of \$7182.28 as an inheritance tax.

Foote & Davis Co. vs John M. Keith. Judgment rendered in favor of plaintiff in the sum of \$440.24, and defendant to pay costs.

Mrs. Erma Boids LeBourgeois vs. Armand B. LeBourgeois. Judgment in favor of plaintiff, forever dissolving the bonds of matrimony between

them and defendant to pay the sum of \$150 as a full settlement of her rights and as alimony.

Alexius Bros. vs. Levy Jordan. Judgment in favor of plaintiff in the sum of \$167.91 and costs.

State vs. Luther Dillard and Horace Smith. Case referred to Juvenile Court with regard to Luther Dillard, and Horace Smith sentenced to penitentiary for not less than five nor more than seven years at hard labor. Sentence suspended on account of youth, during good behavior.



Public notice is hereby given that the St. Tammany Parish School Board will receive sealed bids for the furnishing and operating of a school transfer wagon, or truck, operating during the school session of 1921-22 between the following points:

First—The residence of Mr. John Peters and the Madisonville High School building, also in the first ward.

Second—Between Blackwell's mill and the Folsom public school building in the second ward, operating over the same route as during the session of 1920-21; and also a transfer running to the Middle Roads school, operating over same route as during the past session.

Third—A transfer to run from a point on the Covington-Franklin road near the site of Knepp's former sawmill to Covington High School, and another transfer to run from the second and third ward boundary line on the Lee Road to the Covington High School; and between William Foeffer's residence on the Lee Road to the Covington High School; and between Sunny Brook Farm on Military Road and the Covington High School.

Fourth—To run between the Lewisburg and the Mandeville High Schools, both in the fourth ward.

Fifth—To run between the residence of Starling Carter and the Sun graded school, both in the fifth ward.

Sixth—To run to the Waldheim school from the Military Road over the same route as the transfer was operated during session of 1920-21.

Bids will be received for the operating of a school transfer over one or more of these routes, and the School Board respectfully asks that each bidder prepare a bid for the operation of the transfers for one, two three years, reserving the right to accept or reject any bid, and for either one, two or three years.

The successful bidder will be required to furnish a bond satisfactory to the School Board for one-half the salary to be earned for the life of the contract, and each bid must be accompanied by cash or certified check amounting to \$25.00.
