### FACTS ABOUT STRAWBERRIES.

Spread for many miles over the fertile soil of Louisiana is a great "Crimson Carpet"—the strawberry belt. Principally in Tangipahoa Parish, in the sections around Hammond and Ponchatoula, the culture of strawberries has grown to be one of the greatest agricultural activities of the State.

Strawberries and cream, a rich combination, seem to symbolize the richness of this section, where great daries flourish, and where thousands of acres are devoted to the culture of luscious berries.

This ruby-red harvest is a goldmine to the parish and the annual production, with a harvest season only a few weeks duration, is well above \$2,500,000. Hundreds of car loads of berries, thousands and thousands of plates shipped North and East in response to a demand that cannot as yet be met!

Strawberry growing is a new industry, but is rapidly being developed. Hammond retains its lead as the shipping center, but parishes adjoining Tangipahoa are increasing

their acreage, and the towns of Amite, Roseland, Independence and Kentwood are busy centers during the harvest and shipping season.

Although limited to a comparatively small area, the cultivation of strawberries places Louisiana among the leaders of the United States in berry culture and production. The quality of the product, moreover, holds a record still higher, and it is doubtful if a finer berry can be grown anywhere.

In developing the industry, there have been constructed factories for the manufacture of boxes and crates, and the business of growing the berries for national consumption is rapidly assuming large proportions.

The climate of Louisiana, one of its greatest natural resources, is an additional reason for the successful venture of strawberry growing in the State. It is not uncommon to have strawberries for breakfast in Louisiana, while the North and East are covered with ice and snow. The industry itself is but another significant indication of the potential greatness of agricultural Louisiana.

The following resolution was introduced by Mr. Banks, who moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. Keller:

Whereas, in the opinion of this Board it is necessary and advisable that a special election should be ordered to be held in School District No. 3 of the Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, at which there shall be submitted the following proposition, to-wit:

To levy a special tax of two and one-half (2½) mills on the dollar on all property in School District No. 3 of the Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, subject to taxation annually for a period of ten (10) years for the purpose of giving additional aid to the public schools of said District No. 3, therefore

Be it resolved by the St. Tammany, Louisiana, Parish School Board in legal session convened, as follows:

Section 1. That a special election and the same is ordered to be held in School District No. 3 in the Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, on Tuesday, August 16, 1921, at which there shall be submitted the following proposition:

Proposition.

To levy a special tax of two and one-half (2½) mills on the dollar on all property in School District No. 3 of the Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, subject to taxation annually for a period of ten (10) years for the purpose of giving additional aid to the public schools of said District No. 3.

Section 2. That the Secretary of this Board be and he is hereby instructed to have prepared for use at said special election a sufficient number of ballots on each of which shall be printed the proposition mentioned in Section 1 of this resolution in the following form:

To levy a special tax of two and one-half (2½) mills on the dollar on all property in School District No. 3 of the Parish of St. Tammany, La., subject to taxation, annually, for a period of ten (10) years, for the purpose of giving additional aid to the public schools of said Dist. No. 3.

Notice To Voters—To vote in favor of the proposition submitted upon this ballot, place a cross (X) mark in the square after the word "YES"; to vote against it, place a similar mark after the word "NO."

And that the secretary of this board be and he is hereby instructed to have prepared for use at such election, all necessary ballot boxes, tally sheets, list of voters, and compiled statement of voters in number and amount.

Section 3. That the polling place of said election shall be at the St. Tammany Parish Courthouse in the Third Ward in the Town of Covington, Louisiana, and that Mrs. J. C. Burns, Mrs. Eugene Wharton and Mr. Percy Barelli are hereby appointed commissioners, and Mr. Charles L. Smith clerk of said election, and that said election shall be conducted under the laws of the state applicable thereto.

Section 4. The President of this board is hereby instructed to give notice of the special election here noted, by a proclamation published according to law, and in said proclamation shall announce that at ten (10) o'clock a. m., on Friday, August 19, 1921, this board will meet at its usual meeting place in the Town of Covington, Louisiana, and in open session proceed to open the ballot box, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, examine and count the returns, and declare the results of the election.

On roll call the following members voted in the affirmative: Dutsch, O'Keefe, FitzSimons, Levy, Talley, Evans, Keller, Banks, Sebastian and Oswald. The following members voted in the negative: None. And the resolution was adopted.
