COUNCIL PASSES ORDINANCE FOR PUBLIC IMP. TAX ELECTION, 3 MILL

No Funds for Maintenance of Streets, Park and Cemetery.

ORDINANCE GETS UNANIMOUS VOTE

Election Date Fixed for 6th of September. Polls Open 7 to 5 O'clock.

Covington, La., Aug. 2, 1921. The council met in regular session on the above date. Present, Robert W. Badon, Mayor; C. H. Sheffield, E. Frederick, A. R. Smith, M. A. Mackie, M. P. Planche, C. E. Schonberg. Absent, none.

The minutes of the meetings of June 7th and 24th were read and on motion of A. R. Smith, seconded by H. A. Mackie, and carried, were adopted as read.

On motion of H. A. Mackie, seconded by M. P. Planche, and carried, above reports were referred to the Finance Committee.

It was moved by C. E. Schonberg, seconded by C. H. Sheffield, that the following ordinance be adopted:

ORDINANCE NO. 82.

Whereas, in the opinion of the Town Council of Covington, La., it is necessary and advisable that a special election should be ordered to be held in the Town of Covington, La., at which shall be submitted the following proposition:

To levy a special tax of three (3) mills on the dollar on all the property of the Town of Covington, La., subject to taxation annually for a period of five years, for the purpose of providing additional means for the construction, repair and maintenance of the public streets of the Town of Covington, improving the Bogue Falaya Park, and the Public Cemetery of said Town, the amount of \$500.00 out of said tax to be used annually for said park, and the amount of \$200.00 out of said tax to be used for said cemetery, which said proposition shall be submitted to the qualified electors of said town.

Therefore be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Covington, in regular and legal session convened:

Section 1. That a special election be, and the same is hereby ordered to be held in the Town of Covington, La., on the 6th day of September, 1921, on Tuesday, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said Town of Covington, La., entitled to vote thereat, the question of a levy of a special tax of three (3) mills on the dollar of all property in the said Town, subject to taxation, annually, for a period of five years, for the purpose of, and the proceeds of said tax to be used in the construction, repair and maintenance of the public streets of said town, improving the Bogue Falaya Park, and the Public Cemetery of said Town, the amount of \$500.00 out of said tax to be used annually for improvement of said park, and the amount of \$200.00 out of said tax to be used annually for said cemetery.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that the secretary of the Town Council be and he is hereby instructed:

SCENES AT FUNERALS CONDUCTED BY LEGION



A. L. FENDLASON BURIED WITH MILITARY HONORS

Ex-Soldier Who Served in France With American Expeditionary Forces

LARGEST FUNERAL SEEN IN FOLSOM

Both Civil and Military Ceremonies Take Place at the Grave.

Death always brings its sorrows to a community, but the death of Lawton A. Fendlason, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. N. Fendlason, of Folsom, was unusually sad, not only in the loss of a young man of promise and popularity, but in the termination of a life that had survived the hardships and dangers of service in defense of his country.



Corporal Lawton A. Fendlason was with the American Expeditionary Forces in France, having sailed June 22, 1918, and being assigned to the 134th Guard Company, U. S. C. He was honorably discharged October 10, 1920. A few weeks ago he accepted a position with the N. O. & N. Railroad Co., working with the train crew. He was popular with the crew and faithful to the company in the discharge of his duties. While coupling a freight car he slipped and fell beneath the wheels, which severed one leg close to the body. He was taken to the Jackson, Miss., hospital, near which town the accident occurred, and died Friday, July 29, in spite of the best of medical skill. He was 20 years 11 months and 20 days of age.

Engineer H. M. Cooper, of Varnado, brought the body to Folsom on a special train and the funeral took place from the Fendlason home in that place Sunday, July 31, services being conducted by Rev. D. A. Booth of the Baptist Church, and Commander Lieut. Benj. W. Miller of the American Legion, both of Folsom. The body was interment being made in the cemetery near Folsom.

This was the first military funeral conducted in the Second Ward. The ceremonies were similar to those performed at the funeral of Robert H. Burns in Covington. The bugle sounded church call, taps, and played the military out of the inclosure at the grave, after which the church service took place, in which Rev. D. A. Booth officiated. The firing squad used side arms. The intonation of the guns over the body in the grave, the sounding of the bugle, the tense attitude of the great throng about the grave, all bespoke the solemnity of the occasion and the trying moment when those departed are forever lost to the vision of earthly things, to pass quietly into the eternity that is beyond the comprehension of mortals.

The pallbearers were made up of three members of the American Legion, Messrs. Philip Burns, Leroy M. Haynes, and Mr. Holloway, representing the Bouslog Legion, and the three members of the Trainmen's Association, Messrs. E. R. Sumerail, S. E. Pigott, S. L. Parker.

The funeral was very largely attended and on all sides expressions of sympathy and regret could be heard. Everybody had a good word for Lawton and he will be sadly
