


### POULTRY CACKLES

**CARING FOR GROWING CHICKS**  
Essentials to Best Growth Are Good Coops, Cleanliness, Food, Water and Free Range.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)  
The care of growing chicks, especially during warm weather, is most important, say specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture. Every boy or girl member of a poultry club should give them the best of attention if success is to be had. The baby chicks may be smart little fellows from strong, vigorous parent stock, and they may have been brooded carefully for the first two or three weeks, but unless they receive proper care and management during their later growing period they will not develop properly, and many of them will be lost through disease or sickness. The chief essentials to proper growth are good coops or houses, cleanliness, proper feed and water, shade, and free range.  
Every coop or poultry house used for growing chicks should be kept clean at all times. Sickness or disease starts usually in unclean quarters, and in such places lice and mites are al-

ways more plentiful. Coops and houses should be cleaned and sprayed once a week, and clean shavings, chaff, or sand put on the floor. Examine the chicks and houses often for lice and mites, and if found they should be got rid of at once by following the directions in Department Circular 16, Lice, Mites and Cleanliness, which may be had, free, upon application to the division of publications, United States Department of Agriculture.

A variety of feeds, with fresh, clean water, is necessary if chicks are to grow properly. Perhaps the three most necessary for rapid growth are grain feed, green feed and dry mash. Poultry specialists of the department say that in addition to the green feed and dry mash, which should be provided regularly, a grain mixture should be fed night and morning, giving as large a quantity as the chicks will eat clean, but no more. A good grain mixture for growing chicks consists of three parts cracked corn, two parts wheat, and two parts hulled oats. When available, hulled or rolled oats may be substituted for hulled oats. In localities where hulled oats, hulled or rolled barley cannot be obtained, or are too expensive, a mixture of cracked corn and wheat only may be fed until the chicks are old enough to eat whole oats, when two parts may be added to the corn and wheat mixture.

A reasonable supply of fresh green feed is almost as necessary as grain for growing chicks. If allowed liberty they will get much of it for themselves, but if confined, or if in quarters where green feed is not abundant, it should be supplied regularly. Lawn grass, beet tops, cabbage and lettuce are excellent feeds. When chicks are confined to brood coops with runs, they should be placed on ground where the grass is green and tender, and as fast as it is eaten off, the coop and run should be moved to a place where the grass is plentiful.

In addition to green feeds and grain, dry mash should be kept before growing chicks at all times after they are three or four weeks old. It is best to feed it in a hopper inside the building, or where it will not be exposed to rain or wet. Here is a good dry mash mixture: Two pounds corn meal, two pounds middlings, one pound oatmeal, two pounds wheat bran, one pound beef scrap and one-fourth pound charcoal. Grit and oyster shell also should be provided.

### SMALL FLOCK IN BACK YARD

Two Hens for Each Member of Family Are Recommended as Best by Poultry Specialists.

The average novice can reasonably expect to get an average of at least 10 dozen eggs per hen per year from his small flock in the back yard. On the basis of two hens to each member of the family this will give 20 dozen eggs a year to each person, which amount is about halfway between the average of farm and city consumption. No backyard poultry keeper should be satisfied with less than this, say poultry specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture. Every backyard poultry keeper should try to get as much more as possible. To provide an egg a day for each person, two hens would have to lay 183 eggs each a year.

### POULTRY

**GUINEAS FAVOR FREE RANGE**  
Fowls Can Be Depended Upon to Pick Up Considerable Portion of Their Food.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)  
Most guinea raisers allow their breeding stock free range of the entire farm at all times, and this helps to keep the birds strong and vigorous. During the winter the breeders should have been fed a grain mixture of corn, wheat and oats twice a day, and where no green feed was available, vegetables, such as potatoes, turnips, beets and cabbage. Animal feed is essential to best results and can be supplied by feeding meat scrap or skinned milk. Given free range, where the supply of natural feed during the winter and early spring are ample, as it usually is in the southern portion of the United States, the guineas can be left to pick up a considerable part of their feed, say poultry specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture. Free access to grit, charcoal, and oyster shell is necessary throughout the breeding season. Avoid having the breeders too fat, but keep them in good, firm flesh.  
Like quail and most other wild birds, guinea fowls in their wild state mate in pairs, and this tendency prevails among domesticated guineas, also, provided the males and females are equal in number. As the breeding season approaches, one pair after another separates from the remainder of the flock and ranges off in the fields in search of a suitable nesting place. Once mated this way, the male usually remains with his mate throughout the laying season, standing guard somewhere near the nest while the hen is laying, and ready to warn her of any approaching danger.  
However, it is not necessary to mate them in pairs under domestic conditions to secure fertile eggs, and most breeders keep but one male for every three or four females. When mated in this way the hens are more apt to lay near home, and several usually lay in the same nest, thus making it much easier to find the nests and gather the eggs.  
While guineas can be kept in the best breeding condition upon free

range, still they can be confined, if necessary, and satisfactory results obtained. One extensive guinea raiser has confined as many as 45 hens and 15 males in an acre pen throughout the breeding and laying season and been successful. This pen is inclosed with a wire fence five feet high, and the birds are prevented from flying over by clipping the flight feathers of one wing. Within the pen is a grass pasture with bushes here and there where the hens make their nests by scratching out a bowl-shaped hollow in the ground. The winters being severe, a roosting shed is provided, having a cleated board reaching from the floor to the roosts for the wing-clipped birds to walk up.

### GEESSE GOOD GRAZING STOCK

Fowls Play Important Part in Utilizing Waste Grain About Stables and Feeding Pens.

Geese have an important part in the endless war on waste. They are in a class with chickens in utilizing waste grain about stables and feeding pens. In a larger measure than chickens or any other kind of poultry they are a grazing stock, getting their living in large part from the ordinary grasses of the pastures, say poultry specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture. When it is considered that the demand for geese is steady, and extended over almost the whole year, not confined to holidays, as in the case of turkeys, that geese excel all other poultry as producers of fat, the importance of geese in the poultry scheme is realized.

### STUDY DEMANDS OF MARKETS

Poultryman Should Learn How, Where and When to Dispose of Product to Advantage.

A large part of the profit in poultry keeping often depends upon the proper marketing of the products, and the producer should study the market demands as to how, where and when to dispose of the products to the best advantage.

### MINERAL MIXTURE FOR HOGS

Animals Crave Something in Addition to Feeds Given Them to Meet Growth Requirements.

Hogs need certain minerals to meet their growth requirements. One such mixture that has proved satisfactory is composed of: Charcoal, 50 pounds; wood ashes, 50; epsom salts, 3 pounds. Partly burned corncobs and soft coal are good. It is well to keep a mineral mixture before the hogs all the time.

### PLAN TO PREVENT INFECTION

Newly Purchased Animals Should Be Quarantined in Separate Pens for Two Weeks.

Do not place newly purchased stock, stock procured or borrowed for breeding purposes, or stock exhibited at fairs, immediately with your herd. Keep such stock quarantined in separate pens for at least two weeks, and use care in feeding and attending stock to prevent carrying infection from these to other pens.

FURNISH FOALS WITH GRAIN  
When Pastures Begin to Dry Up Young Animals Must Have Feed for Best Development.  
As the pastures commence to dry up the proper development of the foal calls for the feeding of a little grain in order to maintain the milk fat and keep the foal developing to the best advantage. Colts that belong to working mares should have a separate feed box and receive a little grain each time the mother is fed. Those on pasture should be provided with a creep where grain can be kept available for the foal at all times. If these methods are followed the colt will continue to gain and will not shrink when weaning time comes.
