DEATH OF SISTER M. SCHOLASTICA HOEVELER.

Last Saturday morning at 2:45, the Divine Master called and claimed the valiant soul of our beloved Sister M. Scholastica, at St. Scholastica's Convent, Covington.

Sister M. Scholastica, known in the world as Miss Clara Hoeveler, was born in Pittsburg, Pa., Feb. 7, 1839, and out of this unusually long career spent sixty in the service of God, in the ancient Order of St. Benedict. She was a model religious in every respect, and by her piety, affability and unselfishness, endeared herself, not only to every member of her community, but to every one who had the pleasure of meeting her. In this prolonged span of life, she rendered much valuable service to the community. She was the first Prioress of the Benedictine Sisters in New Orleans, thereafter Superior of Mater Doloresa Convent for thirty-nine years, and also Superior of St. Benedict's Convent for several years. She was a real mother to the Sisters committed to her care, and her hand was always extended to the poor,

needy and distressed. So generous was she in her charity that it was often said of her: "Sister Scholastica cannot keep one dollar upon another."

Rev. John Burger officiated at the obsequies, which took place in the Convent Chapel, Sunday morning at 11:30. The final obsequies at her interment in St. Joseph's Cemetery at St. Benedict, La., were attended by the Right Rev. Abbot Paul, Rev. Fathers and the monastic choir from the Abbey.
