fruit district must have wood materials for crates and packages.

A professor of forestry from a leading Japanese university told of reforestation which has been more or less in vogue in his country for the past three hundred years. The reporter is sorry that he has not at hand the name of this interesting gentleman, whose speech was very pleasing to the audience.

Dr. J. L. Watkins, the game warden, talked about the hunter's part in forest fires.

Mr. Johnson, of the Great Southern Lumber Company, gave an instructive account of his experience in forest fire prevention.

On motion, duly seconded, a resolution was passed recommending the enactment of appropriate laws to make the trappers and hunters responsible for fires set out or caused by them, that all hunting licenses issued contain a proviso that same will be revoked on failure of the holder to observe fire regulations, that the hunting season for all game open on November 1st and end on March 1st of each year, and that all lumbermen, railroad men, and persons engaged in the manufacture of wood products be required to exercise care in the prevention of fires in the forest.

On motion by Mr. Simmons, duly seconded, and unanimously carried, the chairman was instructed to appoint commissioners from each ward in the parish to call upon and ask the Police Jury at the next January jury meeting to employ a farm demonstrator and agent for St. Tammany parish for the year 1922.

Dr. W. E. VanZandt, of Mandeville, suggested the desirability of a parish-wide organization, which like those of professional societies, would hold its meetings at regular intervals from place to place over the parish to enable the farmers in each locality to discuss together their farm problems and at these meetings having experts to counsel them and to make suggestions for farm developments and improvements. This suggestion was warmly seconded by Mr. Sondregger. Mr. Bachemin also spoke of movement for organization of the work of the American Farm Bureau in this parish which will be undertaken about the middle of this month on dates soon to be announced.

Meeting was closed with prayer led by Mr. Neuhauser.
