

BIG CATCH OF FUR ANIMALS PROMISED

The trade in Louisiana furs this season promises to be prosperous. Only a sharp break in the market will keep the product down to a point anywhere near that of last season. Unfortunately, there has always been a sharp decline, and the market is yet unsettled, with a downward tendency. And yet the prices are much higher than last year, and there are more trappers in the field, so that fur dealers predict that the catch will equal or exceed the great catch of 1919. A sharp break in the market a week or two ago, when prices declined 25 per cent, caught trappers, but most of the dealers, who had anticipated something of the sort, got from under in time. The manufacturers of New York can make into garments for the winter furs received up to December 10, and New Orleans dealer estimating their holdings at 75 to market before that time, and so disposed of their holdings at remunerative prices.

Trappers, however, believed prices would still climb and most of them held their catch, one New Orleans dealer estimating their holdings at 75 per cent of the season's catch. The decline came with this stock still in their hands, and they were compelled therefore to make the loss. After this sharp decline there was still a disposition to cut prices, it being said that New York manufacturers, who make 75 per cent of the fur garments of the country, had not and declined to further pay the high price prevailing. Since the market has been unsettled, with a somewhat downward tendency, but prices are still much higher than last year, and trappers in the field are active and making fine catches. The principal marketable furs of Louisiana are coon, muskrat and mink, all popular furs, and New Orleans is the principal fur center of the country. It is a notable fact that Louisiana and Arkansas contribute fully half of the coon skins of the country, and these pelts are much sought after by the manufacturers.

Louisiana trappers are acquainting themselves with the provisions of the amendment to the fur law which permits them to ship their individual catch out of the State upon paying in advance the severance tax of 2 per cent to the Conservation Department. The value of skins naturally varies, prime skins being worth several times those of No. 4 grade, but from time to time the Conservation Department will fix the prices per fur on the basis of a fair average, so that trappers may know exactly what amount of tax to pay on each of their shipments. Trappers are applying regularly for tags for shipments, and it is evident that much of the catch is being disposed of outside the State, mainly in St. Louis, but New Orleans dealers say they have felt no effects of the outside shipments thus far, perhaps because the catch has been unusually heavy. If the new law has affected local receipts at all, say the local dealers, the effect has been inappreciable.

PROSPEROUS SHRIMP SEASON DRAWING TO A CLOSE

The close season for shrimp in inside waters in Louisiana began December 1 and will extend to February 15, 1922. During this short period the taking of shrimp from the inside waters of the State for any purpose whatsoever is absolutely prohibited by law. This does not prevent the lovers of this crustacean delicacy from eating their favorite shell fish, however, for shrimp taken from outside waters may be marketed in their fresh state only. For canning and drying purposes, however, the taking of shrimp in outside waters under the jurisdiction of the State must cease January 1, 1922, and may not be resumed until February 15, 1922. During this period drying platforms and canneries must cease operations altogether.

The Louisiana Department of Conservation has sent out letters to its agents and to the canners and dryers of the State, calling their attention to the terms of the law, and insisting that every agent in the State and the inspectors of the department shall use every effort to see to the enforcement of the law, and calling on canners and dryers to cooperate in this enforcement. The season has been a prosperous one for shrimp taking, and the effect of the conservation laws and regulations in keeping up the supply of this prized food is expected to influence the dealers in this product in assisting in the enforcement of the law by the conservation agents.

PLACING NATURAL GAS IN REACH OF THE PEOPLE

The enormous natural gas resources of Louisiana are soon to be placed within reach of the people of the State. Recently at a conference held by Gov. Parker and M. L. Alexander, commissioner of the Conservation Department, it was decided that the department headed by Mr. Alexander should inaugurate the work. Mr. Alexander informed the Governor that his department could do the preliminary work, and decide on the route to be established and the cost involved, so that private enterprise could take the matter of supply up, or failing private enterprise the Legislature would have the information necessary to the handling of the proposition by the State. There are two divisions of the department especially adapted to this work—the engineering and the mineral departments.
