traffic manager of the N. O. G. N. regretted being unable to be present, due to urgent business on hand in the office; however he wanted to be said that he offers all co-operation possible, and that the railroad will offer the best service possible if the shipments are great enough to demand same.

Mr. J. Cotton, representing one of the South's greatest seed houses, spoke on the importance of good seed and gave a few timely suggestions and good points on watermelon growing and marketing. Mr. Varnado, a local merchant, did not make a talk but wished it to be known that he was willing to furnish the farmers the best grade fertilizer at a very reasonable price.

Mr. Sheridan then took charge of the meeting and explained his proposition to the farmers present. He stated he could not enter into a contract as asked by some, as such a contract would be one-sided and not fair to both parties concerned, as the farmer could not guarantee the melons as they were not produced as yet. He stated he wanted to guarantee the farmers he would buy all melons produced that were of a marketable size, and would pay market prices for same at time of buying, and wanted to have as many competitive buyers as possible on the grounds. Mr. Sheridan wants to co-operate to the fullest extent, but the farmers must assure him that they will produce enough to allow him to make shipments of ten to fifteen cars each day during the melon season. Mr. Sheridan also made several good offers, one was a Ford automobile to be given to the farmer who produced the most of the best melons to one acre, provided the farmers shipped 300 carloads during the months of June and July.

Planting will take place between March 10th and 15th, and crop will be ready to market around the middle of June. On a basis of approximately 45 hills to the acre, checked in drills and rows of 9 feet by 9 feet, and a conservative estimate of two marketable melons produced in each drill, the average yield would be estimated at 1000 melons weighing about 16 to 20 pounds each per acre. Estimating that fifty per cent of the crop will be marketed in northern markets, there would be nearly 200 carloads of melons moved out of Washington parish this year. The "Tom Watson" was selected as the best melon for market purposes.

A large acreage will also be planted in beans, Irish potatoes and truck crops.
