POLICE JURY PROCEEDINGS.

Covington, La., April 11, 1922.

The Police Jury met in regular session on the above date with the following members present: Theo. Dendinger, Jr., H. N. Fenderson, C. M. Poole, J. M. Smith, R. C. Cooper, W. H. Davis, Emile Singletary, J. B. Howze, Emile Burkenstock, J. B. Howze, Emile Burkenstock.

It was moved by J. M. Smith, seconded by Emile Burkenstock, that the petition asking that a road be built from Fontenot station on the Shore Line of the Great Northern Railroad, to Amos station on the Main Line of the Great Northern, a distance of about 3 1/2 miles, be granted. Carried.

It was moved by C. M. Poole, seconded by Emile Burkenstock, that the police jury give what dipping solution they have on hand to parties wishing to dip, and buying testing articles for parties using them, by applying to the office of the police jury. This applies to parties who have no testing articles, and to parties wishing to use the solution who live in the third ward, as most of the wards have solution left over from last year, and parties in these wards can get the solution by applying to the former dipping vat in inspector or the police jury of their respective wards. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that the police jury buy the clerk's office two steel filing cabinets, and to get a price on same. Carried.

On motion, duly seconded, the president of the police jury is hereby directed, instructed and empowered to apply to the Louisiana Commission of the State of Louisiana for fifteen thousand six hundred dollars (\$15,000) for the maintenance of the following highways:

- Route No. 37, Covington-Slidell—27.5 miles.
- Route No. 7, Bush-Covington-Hammond, 7 miles.
- Route No. 2, Slidell-Pearl River, 3.7 miles.
- Route No. 58, Pearl River-Talshiek-Covington, 29.8 miles.
- Talshiek-Bush, 8 miles.

On motion, duly seconded, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Be it resolved, That F. J. Martindale, secretary of the police jury, be and he is hereby directed to give public notice that the exclusive privilege of operating a ferry from Indian Village, Louisiana, to Logtown, Miss., within a radius of two miles of Indian Village shall be let for a period of ten years by the police jury after thirty days' advertisement in The St. Tammany Farmer, as the law provides.

On motion, duly seconded, the following ordinance was unanimously adopted:

AN ORDINANCE Be it ordained by the Police Jury in legal session convened, That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to pile, stack or cord any material of any nature or kind on the shoulders of the public roads of the Parish of St. Tammany, or to drive any automobile, truck or vehicle of any kind across the ditches on either side of the roads of the Parish of St. Tammany.

Be it further ordained, That any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be fined in the sum not less than \$10 nor more than \$50, or imprisonment in the parish jail not less than ten days nor exceeding sixty days, or both, at the discretion of the Court.

Be it further ordained, That all laws or parts of laws in conflict herewith be hereby repealed.

Be it further ordained, That this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.
