If there is an infectious disease in the home, no inmate of the home should be permitted to attend church or any public gathering. In fact, if the disease is quarantinable, none of the persons in the home should be allowed to go out. Social gatherings should by no means be per-

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mitted in homes where chicken pox, measles or other communicable disease is present. The Epidemiologist of the State Board of Health tells how the two diseases mentioned were the starting point at social gatherings of wide spread epidemics. At a birthday party that he attended, a young sister of the hostess had measles at the time, and the day after the party the hostess herself developed the measles. They had fourteen guests, eleven of whom had not had measles. Nine of the eleven developed measles, and that was the starting point of an epidemic of several hundred cases.

During the parish-wide prevalence of influenza a few weeks ago the Covington Board of Health had occasion through The Farmer to explain that the disease was spread principally through droplets of mucus expelled from the mouth and nose of infected persons, from which we deduct that the theoretical way to avoid the disease is to keep away from the sick. That timely advice was construed as a report of influenza in epidemic form, and not less than two progressive Covington women complained that they knew friends who thereupon altered plans to come to Covington, and these women requested the Board to suppress facts relative to infectious diseases. We cannot believe that any one would deliberately have their friends run into danger, but that is what their recommendations, if followed, would mean.

I trust that our citizen body will henceforth use more discretion in matters relating to infectious diseases. If they fail to do so, the Board of Health will be forced to

adopt a policy more protective of the public health.
