The Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, will, up to 12 o'clock noon on June 13, 1922, receive sealed bids for the purchase of Two Hundred and Fifty Thousand (\$250,000) Dollars par value of bonds of Road District No. 2 of said parish, dated April 1, 1921, and maturing serially on April 1st of the years 1923 to 1941, both inclusive, and bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually.

Proper proceedings authorizing the sale of these bonds at a price of par and not less than ninety cents on the dollar and accrued interest were taken.

Bids must be addressed to the Secretary of the Police Jury, Covington, Louisiana, and each bid shall be accompanied by a certified check for Sixty-two Hundred and Fifty (\$6,250) Dollars payable to the Treasurer of Police Jury of Parish of St. Tammany and drawn on some bank organized under the laws of the State of Louisiana, or some National Bank domiciled in the State of Louisiana. Be it ordained by the Police Jury, in legal session convened, that all that part of the Parish of St. Tammany lying east of Pearl River, commencing at the mouth of Pearl River east of the Rigolets and Lake Shore to the southwest corner of section 11, tp 10 s, range 14 east; thence north of section line to the southwest corner of section 35 tp 7 s, range 14 east; thence east on township line to southeast corner of the southeast corner of southwest corner of section 31, tp 7 s, range 15 east; thence north through center of section 31, tp 7 s, range 15 east; thence east on section line to corner of sections 29, 28, 32 and 33, tp 7 s, r 15 east; thence north of section line to corner common to sections 20, 21, 28, and 29, tp 7 s, r 15 east; thence east on section line between sections 21, 28, 22 and 27, tp 7 s, r 15 east, to west bank of Pearl River; thence down Pearl River to the place of beginning, shall constitute the Eighth Ward of the Parish of St. Tammany.

Be it further ordained, that all ordinances contrary to or inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed insofar as they conflict herewith but not further.
