search food was. Another thing which I think worthy of mention, which will show the affection which existed between the slave and his master, and which no one who had not been raised in the South could ever understand. Among this household there was one member which deserves special mention and that was an old negro man. When his young master had to leave his family and go to fight, he called the old man up and said to him, "Uncle Ike, I'm going off today to join the army, and I am leaving my old father and my sisters and their helpless little ones in your care, for you know what the Guerillas and Jay Hawks are—a band of men much more to be dreaded than the Yankees—for they live in the woods and support themselves by raiding the farm houses whose men are off fighting for their rights, and help themselves to horses or whatever they want in the way of food, scarce as it is. Now, you know, Uncle Ike, what I am afraid of, and how I trust you?" "Yas sir, yas, Marse George, and if dem blasted skunks shows dere faces here pesterin' round dese chillin' ole Ike will show em sumpin'." And shaking hands solemnly master and slave parted, each to take the path of duty. The old man was faithful to his trust, and lived for many years after the war, honored and respected by all.
