AN ORDINANCE levying a tax for the year 1922.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany in legal session convened that the taxes for the year 1922 be and the same are hereby levied on all the taxable property in the Parish of St. Tammany, as follows, to-wit: For the Criminal Fund there shall be levied the sum of three-quarters of one mill. For the Road Fund there shall be levied the sum of two and one-quarter mills. For the General Fund there shall be levied the sum of one mill. For the School Fund there shall be levied the sum of three mills.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, ec., That all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.
