




ORDINANCE making it unlawful to operate any motor vehicle on the streets of Town of Covington, La., unless same is registered and equipped with two license plates, as provided by Act 120 of 1921 of Acts of Gen.

hicle, or to: the owner or custodian of such vehicle to permit the same to be operated on any of the streets or alleys of the Town of Covington, La., unless such vehicle is registered under the provisions of Act 120 of 1921 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, and unless equipped with two license plates issued by the Secretary of State of Louisiana, in accordance with said Act, same to be displayed in a conspicuous place in the front and rear of said vehicle. Provided, that motor vehicles owned by non-residents of Louisiana who have complied with the laws of the State or County from which they came, relative to motor vehicles and the operation thereof, may be operated on the streets of the Town of Covington, La., without such registration, for a period of 90 days, provided such vehicles display two license plates, as above required, of the State or County from which they came.

Section 2 Be it further ordained, etc., That any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon trial and conviction thereof, be fined not more than \$100.00, or be imprisoned not more than 30 days, or both, in the discretion of the court. And said ordinance having been reduced to writing and read, was adopted by sections and as a whole on roll call by the following vote: Ayes: C. E. Schonberg, C. H. Sheffield, A. R. Smith, H. A. Mackie, and Robt. W. Badon, mayor. Nays: None.
