



"We will pay you \$29,413.00 and accrued interest for the above bonds, and will guarantee you a rate of 3 1/2 per cent on deposits of the funds arising from the sale of the bonds, and 3 per cent on the sinking fund, same to be deposited with the Commercial Bank & Trust Co., Mandeville, La., or

"We will pay you \$30,009.3 and accrued interest for the above bonds, and will guarantee you a rate of 3 1/2 per cent on deposits of the funds arising from the sale of the bonds, and the sinking fund, to be deposited with the Commercial Bank & Trust Company, of Mandeville, La., without interest thereon."

Caldwell & Co., Nashville, Tenn., bid: "On delivery to us in New Orleans, La., or Nashville, Tenn., we will pay you the sum of \$30,083. and accrued interest. A further condition of our bid is that if the proceeds of the sale and the sinking fund for paying the interest and retiring the above bonds are deposited in a bank or banks in the Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, satisfactory to you and designated by us, said bank or banks are to pay you 4 per cent daily balances on said deposits. You are to furnish us the unqualified approving opinion of Wood & Oakley, of Chicago, or John C. Thompson, of New York. We agree to furnish and print bonds free of charge and pay attorneys fees for approving the bonds. We hand you herewith our certified good faith check for \$100 to be liquidated as damages in case we fail to comply with the above contract."

All bids having been read in full and due and careful consideration having been given the same, the following resolution was unanimously adopted: Be it resolved by the Town Council sometimes called the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Mandeville, La., in legal session convened, That the bid of Caldwell & Company, of Nashville, Tenn., for the purchase of said \$32,000.00 Municipal Improvement Bonds of the Town of Mandeville, be and the same is hereby accepted, and the Mayor and Secretary of the Town of Mandeville, La., be and they are hereby authorized and directed to deliver to said purchaser all of said bonds upon the payment of the purchase price thereof in accordance with the terms of the aforementioned bid. And all other bids received, opened and considered as above set forth be rejected.

And said resolution having been regularly and legally put before said council and considered, on roll call the members of the Town Council of Board of Aldermen, voted as follows: Ayes: W. E. VanZant, Mayor; James Band, Steve Josza, W. A. Griffin, W. R. Smith, Edmond Boudot. Nays: None.

There being no further business this meeting, the Council, adjourned subject to call.

Meeting of December 5, 1922. Mandeville, La., Dec. 5, 1922.

A regular meeting of the Town Council, sometimes called the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Mandeville, was held in said town on the 5th day of December, 1922. There were present: Steve Josza, Mayor Pro Tem; James Band, W. R. Smith, W. A. Griffin, Edmond Boudot. There was absent, Dr. W. E. VanZant, Mayor. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted.

On motion of James Band, and seconded by W. A. Griffin, the following resolution was adopted: A RESOLUTION of the Town Council, sometimes called the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Mandeville, Louisiana, authorizing the issuance of municipal improvement bonds in the amount of Thirty-two Thousand (\$32,000) Dollars and certifying the form and details thereof and providing for the execution of the same. Whereas, at an election heretofore duly called and held in the Town of Mandeville, La., on the 25th of May, 1921, there was submitted to the qualified property tax paying voters the proposition of incurring debt for the purpose of completing the sea wall, dredging a channel through the ravine in Square No. 27 and repairing, improving and hardurfacing streets in said town, and to issue and sell negotiable semi-annual interest bearing coupon bonds of said town, evidencing the said indebtedness, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually and to run for a period of twenty-five (25) years from their date, principal and interest of said bonds to be paid at such places as the governing authorities might determine, and both principal and interest to be secured and paid by a sufficient tax levied and collected in each year in accordance with the provisions of article XIV, Section 14, subdivision one (1) of the Constitution and Section 39 of the General Bond Act No. 46 of the General Assembly of 1921, and.

Whereas, proper notice of said election was duly and regularly held and a majority in number and amount of the property taxpayers, qualified as electors, under the laws and Constitution of the State of Louisiana, voting at said election, authorized the issuance of said bonds, and.

Whereas, the Town Council has investigated the regularity of the proceedings taken to issue said bonds and hereby determines that the same are in all respects regular and in conformity with the law.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Town Council of the Town of Mandeville, sometimes called the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, as follows: Section 1. There shall be issued negotiable coupon municipal improvement bonds of said town in the sum of Thirty-two Thousand (\$32,000.00) Dollars, said bonds to be dated May 26, 1921, to be of the denomination of \$500 each, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable annually January 1 and July 1 of each year, such interest to be evidenced by interest bearing coupons attached to said bonds. Said bonds shall be numbered from 1 to 64, both inclusive,

Section 2. Said bonds shall be signed by the Mayor of said town and attested by the Town Secretary and sealed with the corporate seal of said town.

Section 3. Attached to said bonds shall be interest coupons representing the installments thereon, said coupons to be executed by the facsimile signatures of said Mayor and Secretary. Both principal and interest of said bonds shall be made payable at the Chase National Bank in the City and State of New York.

Section 4. The form of said bonds shall be substantially as follows: United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany, Town of Mandeville.

The Town of Mandeville, in Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, acknowledges itself to owe and for value received hereby promises to pay to the bearer hereof, the sum of Five Hundred (500.00) Dollars in lawful money of the United States of America, on the 26th day of May, 19... with interest thereon from the date hereof, at the rate of five per centum per annum, payable semi-annually on the 1st days of January and July in each year upon presentation and surrender of the attached interest coupons as they severally become due. Both principal and interest of this bond are payable at the Chase National Bank in the City and State of New York.

This bond is one of a series of bonds of like date and tenor, except as to maturity, aggregating the sum of Thirty-two Thousand (\$32,000) Dollars issued by said Town of Mandeville under the authority of Article XIV, Section 14, subdivision 1 of the Constitution and Section 39 of the General Bond Act No. 46 of the General Assembly of 1921, for the purpose of completing the sea wall, dredging a channel through the ravine in Square No. 27, and repairing, improving and hardurfacing streets in said town, and it is hereby certified, recited and declared that all acts, conditions and things required to be done precedent to and in the issuance of this bond have existed, have happened, and have been performed in regular and due time, form, and manner as required by law, and that this bond together with all other indebtedness of said town does not exceed any constitutional or statutory limit and that provision has been made for the levy and collection of taxes sufficient to pay the principal and interest of this bond as the same respectively become due.

It is also certified that this bond is authorized by and is issued in conformity with the requirements of the Constitution and Statutes of this State.

In witness whereof the Town of Mandeville, Louisiana, has caused this bond to be signed by its Mayor and sealed with its corporate seal, attested by its Secretary, and has caused the interest coupons hereto attached to be executed by the engraved facsimile signatures of said Mayor and said Secretary, and this bond to be dated the 26th day of May, A. D., 1922.

Section 6. After the expiration of the time allowed by law for contesting the proceedings to issue bonds, they shall be registered by the Secretary of the State of Louisiana, and shall have endorsed thereon a certificate of said registration, signed by the Secretary of State under the great seal of the State of Louisiana.

Office of the Secretary of State. This bond is secured by a tax. Registered on this... day of... 19...

Section 7. So long as any of said bonds are outstanding and unpaid, the Town Council of the Town of Mandeville shall impose and collect annually in excess of all other taxes a tax on all the property-subject to taxation by said Town under the Constitution and Laws of Louisiana sufficient in amount to pay the interest semi-annually and the principal falling due each year. Such tax shall be levied and collected by the same officers at the same time and in the same manner as the general taxes of said town. Provision to meet the principal and interest requirement of said bonds and of this resolution shall be made in the annual appropriation bill.

Section 8. This resolution shall take effect from and after its passage.

AN ORDINANCE levying a tax for the year 1923.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, in legal session convened, That the taxes for the year 1923 be and the same are hereby levied on all taxable property in the Parish of St. Tammany, as follows, to-wit: For the criminal fund there shall be levied the sum of three-quarters of a mill. For the road fund there shall be levied the sum of two and one-quarter mills.

For the general fund there shall be levied the sum of one mill. For the school fund there shall be levied the sum of three mills.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That all ordinances or parts of ordinance in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.
