## CITY NEWS.

There is to be gay sport at the Pony Saloon to-night. All the dogs in the Territory will be on the rampage—to say nothing of certain belligerent roosters who are being shod for the occasion.

Mr. JOHN R. MARSHALL, of this place, lately returned from Walla Walla, bringing with him some turkeys and pigeons—something new for this place.

THE SNOW.—We learn that the snow is about eighteen inches deep at Pioneer City. In this place, on Thursday, snow fell to the depth of five or six inches. On the hills, in the rear of the town is much deeper.

The audience at the Forrest Theater on Wednesday night were well entertained by the fun-loving Helman, the inimitable Pardey, the gentlemanly Lindsay, Mrs. Waldron, and other performers. The storm prevented that attendance which the popularity of Mr. Holman entitled him to.

THE JOLLIFICATION BALL, on Monday evening, passed off very pleasantly among both the friends of Mr. Lincoln and Gen. McClellan. Main street was partially illuminated—the anvils were very noisy—whisky extremely abundant—fireworks very fine—and the enthusiasm not very great. The Republicans were happy, and the Democrats contented.

BENEFIT OF JOE MABBOTT.—The Forrest Theater will be opened again on Sunday night, on which occasion Mr. Mabbott will receive a complimentary benefit. He has done much toward contributing to the amusement of our citizens, and is worthy of a full house. The laughable, musical extravaganza, the Peep o' Day Scene, will conclude the performance. It will appear for the first time in this Basin.

AN EXTENSION.—Messrs. Barber & Oldham, of the City Hotel, have lately made a purchase of some ground in the rear of the Hotel, extending back to Montgomery street. They intend to erect an addition to the present building of seventy feet in length which, when completed, will enable them to seat one hundred and fifty persons in the Dining Hall, and lodge one hundred persons.

THE ELK HORN G. & S. M. Co. have recently incorporated, and one of the Directors has gone to San Francisco to procure a ten or twelve stamp mill, which will be put in operation in the Spring. It will be run by hydraulic water power. The ledges are said to be very rich, and are generally supposed to be a continuation of the Gambrius ledges. There are three of them, upon which the company located their claims about sixteen months ago. The names of the officers will be found elsewhere. The prospects of a fortune for all interested are excellent.

THE GAMBRIUS MILL is giving a good account of itself. The second clean up, after a run of three days, gave about three hundred pounds of amalgam. Stock is now held at a high figure, and the holders thereof are exceedingly jubilant. The ledge is undoubtedly one of the richest ever worked in this or any other part of the United States. The gratifying result of the crushing is giving surrounding ledges a new impetus, and has very encouraging effect among mineral owners generally. There is no doubt that many other ledges, equally as rich, will soon show their true worth under the unappealing despotism of the non-stamps preparing for them.

In Boston the authorities have commenced a raid against all fast drivers and fast women. Women seen in the streets after dark will be taken up, and as the order directs their "male companions" to be arrested also, it is plain that folks won't go to the theater at night under pain of incarceration.

KENYON, of the Lewiston Age, has sued the O. S. N. Co., for \$15,000 damages, alleged to have been sustained some time ago—the steamer being run into by a bull. Kenyon had a "pass."

A 500 lb bell has been ordered at Walla Walla for the Catholic Church. It will be rung three times a day—at noon, and at six o'clock morning and evening.

THE Soldiers' vote at the Bonanza (Cal.) Barracks, stood in one box, Lincoln 179; McClellan, 41. In another box, Lincoln 162; McClellan 68.

Everybody are going to see the war scenes, storms at sea, foreign views, comical views, &c., &c., at the Forrest Theater to-night.

JUDIA DEAN HAYNE, Potter, Waldron, and others are performing at Portland.

FROM THE EAST.—The dispatches during the week are mostly unimportant. We have dates to the 20th. Sherman was at Kingston preparing for an expedition, supposed to aim at Macon, Ga. He has 60,000 men. Richmond papers say Gen. Howell Cobb, at the head of 6,000 men and some cavalry, was south of Atlanta and steadily driving the Federals. They claim that Early went down the Shenandoah valley to the vicinity of Harper's Ferry. A portion of his troops are still in the valley. They say Sherman will feel a force before he reaches Macon. Hood was at Florence, Ala. Breckinridge is in East Tennessee. Foote, in the House, offered a resolution that the war must go on until independence is secured. A bill was in the Georgia Legislature, advising the Confederate Government to make peace. It was unanimously rejected. It was rumored that McClellan had consented to head a commission of Democrats to visit Richmond and confer with Davis respecting peace. Gold quoted on the 20th at 220. In S. F. greenbacks selling at 46 @ 47.

INDIAN JUSTICE.—The chiefs of the Nez Perce—five in number—were sitting in council as a tribunal, last week, to investigate charges against members of the tribe, male and female. The most important case was that of an unfaithful spouse and her seducer. Upon hearing the evidence pro and con, it was decided that the parties were guilty. The "gay Lothario" was sentenced to receive twenty lashes, and to be mulcted to the amount of three cows and two cayuses. The dusky Dulcinea suffers a flagellation for her part of the guilt, her former lord and master to reclaim her if he wishes. Several Indians were sentenced to receive lashes for drunkenness. We have been told by a white man, who was present at this savage court, and understands the Nez Perce dialect, that the chiefs expressed creditable sentiments upon the importance of morality in the tribe, and their determination to rigorously punish violations of its principles; the burden of their advice was that the Nez Perces were now walled in by the white man's enterprise, and that they must hereafter conform with his customs.—[Age.]

SINGULAR BET.—C. H. Pyle and E. H. Schwatky, of Yreka, California, made the following singular bet previous to the election: If Siskiyou county goes for McClellan, C. H. Pyle is to saw half a cord of black oak wood in front of the Court House, with a ball and chain attached to his leg; the usual price to be paid for sawing; the money to go to the Sanitary Fund. If the county goes for Lincoln, Schwatky to do the same. By the returns, it appears that Siskiyou county was carried for McClellan, so Mr. Pyle will be required to pile on that ball and chain and saw that little pile of wood.
