We doubt not that Magnolia Hall will be irradiated and adorned by the brightest stars in the constellation of Idanpan beauty.

THE DRUMMOND LIGHT, alias the Great Panoptique, was displayed last Saturday night at the Forrest Theater to a very good house. Notwithstanding some defects in the machinery by which some of the beauties of the various scenes were lost, the Panoptique was a success. Views of scenery by land and sea, of the principal cities of historic interest, of many noted buildings and objects, and portraits of distinguished men, composed the programme for the evening. We learn that it will be taken to all the principal towns in this vicinity, and it is certainly well worth visiting.

SOCIABLE.—In another place we publish the Constitution and By-Laws of the Philharmonic Society, recently organized for the purpose of devising ways and means for killing the ennuis inseparable from the dreary storms, and lengthened nights of a Bannock Winter. It will meet at Prior's building on Main street. Mr. Prior has fitted up a commodious room, one door above the Saloon, and will furnish it with late publications, magazines and newspapers, from all parts of the United States. The admission fees and weekly dues will be but a small item, sufficient only to defray the expenses of light and firewood. The Society is designed for social enjoyment, and though called a Philharmonic Society, it will be equally as much Philologic, Philanthropic, Philomatic, Philopolemic, Philosophistic, and Philotechnic.

YOUR WASHING.—A friend suggests to us that some good can be accomplished by reminding the public that there are many families in this vicinity in indigent circumstances, who would be glad to receive work by which they can support themselves and children. Several of these families have received material assistance from the Immigrant Relief Society. Most of these are widows, or women whose husbands or fathers, have been disabled from labor by accident or sickness. There are quite a number of the washing for the hotels, and bachelor residents. These Chinamen are all very well in their own way, but they are sadly in the way of these poor women who would gladly place themselves beyond the necessity of asking relief from their neighbors, if they could get this work. Most of these Chinamen are in good circumstances, and are "salting away" their money for future use in China. The poor women who are anxiously looking around for their daily bread, have certainly greater claims for work and relief than these Chinamen. Bachelors! show your chivalry by packing up your clothes and sending them to some of these widows and poor women. P. S. The foregoing was not intended to include the Chinaman, "Tycoon," who keeps a little laundry on Wall street, in which he does the Idaho washing of the Boise Statesman. As "Tycoon's" letters do not show much of a man, there is a suspicion afloat that Tycoon is a Celestial female, and therefore entitled to all the washing she wants. This is probably a slander; but as "Tycoon" will be in adverse circumstances in a short time, he is entitled to the public charity. But we warn our friends to count their shirts before they send them there.

THE IDAHO SLIDING CLUB.—This famous Club having immortalized itself last winter, is preparing to perpetuate its immortality by carrying on another winter campaign against any and all other rivals. We observe a pile of lumber already on the ground to be used in repairing and bridging some holes on the Wall street hill. Mr. Cody contributed \$25. for the necessary repairs, and other parties have paid up liberally, and they intend soon to be in readiness to extend a challenge to Centerville, Placerville, "or any other man," to meet them upon the slippery grade, and compete for the mastery of the world. The Placerville Club, we understand, has already prepared an immense sleigh, with which they expect to run down everything on the track. The race last winter between these two Clubs, at Centerville, was a very exciting episode in the snowy era of that year, and unquestionably the combatants will have an opportunity to fight their battles over again during this season. Meanwhile we shall lay back in our chair, and melt our frozen ink, to be in readiness to make a record of as many broken heads, legs and arms as possible.

OUR LATITUDE.—Mr. J. H. Slater of Boise city, took a solar observation at this place last week, to determine the latitude of Idaho city. We learn from him that he has determined the correct figures by several observations, and is certain that it is correct. He places Idaho city in 43 degrees, 46 minutes. This fixes the town a few miles farther south than it is laid down on Bancroft's map. This line extended eastward, runs through Minnesota, crossing the Mississippi river near La Crosse and Sheboygan, Wisconsin; thence through the northern portion of Michigan to Toronto, Canada West; thence to Ticonderoga, N. Y., through the White Mountains of New Hampshire to Yarmouth, Maine. That it may be fixed more definitely in our minds by points on the Pacific coast, we give the latitude of prominent towns here, derived from Bancroft's Almanac, 1863. San Francisco, latitude 37 degrees, 47 minutes. The difference is therefore about six degrees. Portland, Oregon, is in 45 degrees, 30 minutes. Walla Walla, approximately, 46 degrees, 3 minutes. Eugene city is in 44 degrees, 3 minutes. Umpqua, on the coast, is in a corresponding latitude with Idaho city.

WINTER IN IDAHO.—Winter announces its arrival among us with the merry ringing of sleigh bells, and the happy shouts of schoolboys reveling in the snow drifts. The country now appears decidedly wintry, but notwithstanding the snowy accumulations, thousands of earnest faces are turned hopefully toward the wide-spreading clouds, blessing these frozen children of the skies, and praying for the coming of more. These snow banks are laying up a stock upon which thousands of hardy miners will make liberal draughts in the warm days of Spring. The want of them one year ago detained hundreds here who otherwise long ago would have made wives and children in sunnier lands bappy with their coming. Should these snows continue to accumulate, they will make lively times in the Boise Basin in the Spring.

AN INTERESTING GAME.—Mr. Thomas Prior, of this city, has shown us a written agreement which he has made with J. C. Robinson, to contest their skill at draughts (checkers). The games will be played at Prior's saloon next Wednesday evening. The parties will play for fifty dollars a side, total of one hundred dollars for the winner. Thirteen games will be played, the winner of the majority of the thirteen taking the stakes. The games will commence at one o'clock p.m. It is agreed that each party shall have one and a half minutes in which to make a move, and no piece is to be touched by either party without making a move. C. D. Cagwin and W. B. Knapp are appointed Referees. Parties desiring to witness the game will be admitted—admission one dollar.
