At the head of Moore's Creek it is reported at five and six feet. Notwithstanding the ground has gone from our sight, the weather has been mild and pleasantly warm.

They are well attended and emphatically happy gatherings.

The music on these occasions is complete and excellent, the room capacious, and the exercise delightful. Mr. Brower has opened a school for instruction in the waltz, dances, waltzes and all other forms of figurative music: and these assemblies are rendered very agreeable by the presence of many ladies and gentlemen attached to the school, and also of many who have graduated in the series long ago, and who still "love the hamms where melody dwells." A NEW YEAR'S BALL.—Dancing is the prevailing amusement in this camp, and balls, assemblies, and parties are generously offering sources of enjoyment in that line for all who love that oft described "light, fantastic toe." THE GAMBRINUS MILL AND LEDGE.—A local correspondent furnishes us with a statement of the work done by the Gambrinus mill. The mill arrived on the first of November. On the 6th, through the able superintendence of the engineer, Mr. Spears, the mill had steam up. On the 10th it was crushing ore. On the 14th they made the first clean up, after crushing four days, and running through 62 tons of rock. The result was 221 pounds of amalgam. The next clean up was on the 23d, after crushing 110 tons, which yielded 450 pounds of amalgam. The next was the cleaning up of 80 tons, which yielded 350 pounds. The gold when cleaned and retorted looks well, and assays 675 fine, or about \$14 per ounce. We are not able to give the net yield, as we could not get an assay of all the first run out, owing to the want of proper reports, and we have had but one report from the Assay office, which was on 400 ozs.—net value per oz., \$14.36.

The report of the late late Superintendent, Mr. Burrows, was that the ledge is in fine working order, and about four feet thick, and from appearances, extensive, and that the company had sufficient quartz already out to fill the contract with Messrs. Combs & Co.'s mill, which calls for 1000 tons.

Another ledge, or spur of the main ledge, has within a few days been discovered, which promises to be extensive and rich.

IDAHO is a fast country. If a woman becomes dissatisfied with her husband, or finds some one she likes better, she states the case to the President of the mining district where she resides; he calls a miners' meeting; they untie the matrimonial knot, and she is at liberty to take whomsoever she pleases, provided she can get him.

The foregoing we find in nearly every paper that falls into our hands. The papers in all of the Pacific States and Territories imagine they have "a good thing" on this Territory, when they strike the paragraph, and roll it like a sweet morsel under their tongues. It is unnecessary to say to any man or woman who knows anything about Idaho, that it is a fabrication without even the color of truth. Divorces are obtained by the dissatisfied with sufficient facility from the courts of the Territory to render a resort to a miners' meeting superfluous.

TAXING DITCHES.—The Federal Assessors through the country are issuing circulars, with extracts from the Internal Revenue Law, and calling attention particularly to the following section:

Sec. 103. And be it further enacted, That every person, firm, company or corporation owning or possessing, or having the care or management of any railroad, canal, steamboat, ship, barge, canal-boat, or any vessel, or any stage coach, or other vehicle engaged in transporting passengers or property for hire or in transporting the mails of the United States, or any canal, the water of which is used for mining purposes, shall be subject to and pay a duty of 2 1/2 per centum upon the gross receipts of such railroad, canal, steamboat, ship, barge, canal-boat, or other vessel, or such stage coach or other vehicles.

Under this section all owners of mining ditches, with which Boise Basin is threaded, are liable to the 2 1/2 per cent. upon their receipts.


