Though the atmosphere has been cold—nearly every night below zero—yet the air has been as invulnerable and tranquil as an Autumn evening. It is the only portion of the Pacific coast, that we have any knowledge of, which is not subject to boisterous gales and keen, sweeping winds, at this season of the year.

**NEW YORK AND IDAHO GOLD AND SILVER MINING COMPANY.**—In pursuance to notices published, the subscribers to the capital stock of this company, met at the Church on Commercial street, west of Montgomery, on Thursday last, at 2 o'clock p. m., and organized the company, by making, signing, acknowledging, and filing in the office of the Clerk of the District Court, a certificate of incorporation, as required by law. They then proceeded to adopt by-laws and elect officers for the first three months, and until the first annual election. The following were the officers elected:—President, O. B. Waite of Idaho City; Vice Presidents—G. W. Schenk, of New York; E. W. Cobb, Boston; L. C. P. Freer, of Chicago; Charles H. Peck, of St. Louis; Augustus Kountz, of Omaha; Secretary—Daniel McLaughlin, Idaho City; Treasurer—Paul Cornell, Chicago; Trustees—C. B. Waite, Green White, A. Showers, J. H. Gerrish, R. C. Combs, C. D. Cagwin, J. J. Dooley, (Idaho City), J. Young Scanmon and Mark Skinner, (Chicago.) Edwin Hoyt and David S. Ogden, (New York City.)—Full information as to the character of this company, can be obtained from the President and Secretary. A large quantity of stock has been taken by some of our most substantial citizens.

**PROBATE COURT PROCEEDINGS.**—An adjourned term of the Probate Court of Boise county, commenced on the 14th inst., Hon. H. F. Crain presiding Judge, and Jonas W. Brown, Esq., Clerk.—Considerable business of importance was transacted. On Wednesday, on application of J. K. Shafer, Attorney for the applicant, Frank Davis was appointed Administrator of the estate of Geo. A. Nutall, deceased. In the application of Flanagan for order of Court upon Kline, to pay over moneys received as Administrator, in accordance with statute of distributions, to heirs at law, or legal agent, W. K. Keithly, Attorney for Flanagan, and Gilbert & Hough, Attorneys for Kline,—order granted. In the matter of the application of R. H. Johns to be appointed Administrator of the estate of R. Brume, deceased, contested by Rev. F. Mesplie, also an applicant; Gilbert & Hough, Attorneys for Johns, and Frank Miller Attorney for contestant; after a full examination in the premises, and elaborate argument of counsel, R. H. Johns was appointed Administrator by the Court. In the matter of R. H. Johns, as Administrator of the estate of R. Brume, deceased,—deceased—agent, Louis Burtney, (Gilbert & Hough Attys for Johns, and Frank Miller Atty. for Burtney,) upon motion of Attorney for Defendant, he was discharged unconditionally from the order of the Court requiring him to appear, &c. In the case of Day—agent, White—Shafer for Plaintiff and J. L. McGowan for Defendant, upon motion of Attorney for Plaintiff, judgment was rendered in favor of Plaintiff for amount claimed in complaint. On application and filing of motion of Frank Miller, in the matter of the final settlement of E. J. Post as Administrator of the estate of P. J. Plette, deceased, it was ordered that the proceeds of the sale of property by the Administrator, be paid *pro rata*, to the creditors of the estate. Court then adjourned for the week.

Estate of Jacob Uhl—letters granted to Margaret Uhl. In the matter of guardianship of A. G. Lane, insane—S. Pankham discharged on his own motion, and D. W. Douthitt appointed.

It is hoped that sufficient interest will be taken in this matter by the owners and tenants of buildings in this city to insure a full attendance of the business men.

## An Act to Enable the Courts to Enforce the Specific Performance of Contracts.

Be it enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Idaho, as follows: SECTION 1. In an action upon contract, express or implied, for the direct payment of money or currency, the judgment, whether the same be by default or after verdict, or upon the decision of the Court or the report of a referee, shall follow the contract and be made payable in the kind of money or currency stipulated for thereon, or understood by the terms thereof. PROVIDED, that whenever a written contract to pay "Gold Coin" or its equivalent in gold dust, or bars, be not performed according to the terms of said contract, it shall thereafter, at the option of the party entitled to the benefit thereof, be deemed and held to be a contract to pay gold coin only, within the meaning of this Act, and may be enforced accordingly.

SEC. 2. In an action for the recovery of unliquidated damages, the Court, jury or referee who shall assess the same shall estimate the amount thereof, either in gold or silver coin of the United States, or in United States legal tender paper currency, at the option of the party prosecuting for the recovery of such damages, and the judgment therefor shall be made payable in the kind of money or currency in which such damages shall have been estimated.

SEC. 3. An execution to enforce a judgment for a specified kind of money, shall require the Sheriff to satisfy the same in the kind of money or currency specified in such judgment, and in case of levy and sale of the property of the judgment debtor, he shall refuse payment from any purchaser at such sale, in any other kind of money than that specified in the execution. The Sheriff shall pay over according to law the kind of money recovered on such execution, and in case of neglect or refusal so to do, he shall be liable on his official bond to the judgment creditor in three times the amount of the money collected.

SEC. 4. The certificate of sale of real property on an execution to enforce a judgment for a specified kind of money, shall state the kind of money recovered on such sale, and the notice of sale shall specify the kind of money in which bids may be made at such sale, which shall be the same as that specified in the judgment, and the Sheriff shall state in his returns the kind of money received.

SEC. 5. The purchaser at a sale of real property, on an execution for a specified kind of money, shall be entitled to receive from the redemptioner, and the redemptioners from each other, the kind of money specified in the certificate of sale, before a redemption of such property can be had.

SEC. 6. This Act shall take effect and be in force, from and after its approval by the Governor.
