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INTERESTING FROM HOG 'EM.

PIONEER, July 12th, 1866.

DEAR WORLD.—One would think, from the looks of the Idaho sheet called the "Union," that all the renegade Irishmen in the country had formed a league with the devil and a covenant with hisimps for the purpose of using the larnney stone upon their countrymen, and for lying a few votes into the black ranks.

We pay little attention to it in Hog'em, and care less for its futile attempts. When election day comes we shall not swerve from our duty.—The glorious old Democratic ticket will not fail to sweep everything before it in Hog'em. Holbrook and Crutcher are gaining ground every day. We have got a few Irishmen in these parts yet who are not renegades to their common country's interests, and who have got too much firmness to be led astray by the bally-whacking blarney of all the McLaughlins and Dooleys in Boise county. If the thieves and blacklegs here all vote the Republican ticket it will be as they should do.

At this present writing—6 o'clock, A. M.—Dr. Boatman, the nominee on the black ticket for the Council, and Dooley, the Federal Tax Assessor, with some regular gamblers, are engaged in a poker game. The "Doc." is not much behind, for practice makes perfect and he is decidedly on it, but they have got poor Dooley, at this time, \$50 in debt to one of his opponents. Of course it is supposed he will weigh out when the game closes. Such, dear World, are the stubborn facts, and these are the sort of men Uncle Sam confers his official honors upon, and a few misguided voters of this Territory would confer honors upon with their suffrages.

7 o'clock.—The game closes and Dooley appears with the side of his face skinned. He refused to fight, in any way, on account of size, but after a few slaps he appears anxious to pay. He is willing to accept for income taxes in 50. Miller's name, but was told he could not have the money on that "day out." Of course the Democratic party contains all the thieves and gamblers; so, at least, the more respectable portion of the blacks would have us believe. But I guess, Mr. Editor, they can hold their own with us. Indeed, so far as my observation goes, they can discount us. The game run all night. Elegant business for a would-be Councilman! If any body thinks Dr. Boatman will not run terribly behind his own ticket in Hog'em he can get some liberal bets in these parts. I've not learned just how much the Doc. and Dooley lost, but I hope Uncle Sam is in receipt of daily internal revenue enough to stand his share of it. Send up some more Dooleys from Buena Vista or Bannock if you know of any more. Hog'em is a "sequestered vale" where they can indulge such propensities "with none to molest or make them afraid." It quite "takes the dilapidated linen off the shrubbery." Is your correspondent the editor of the "Union" for a night or two we shall be obliged to "yees."

The fairness and candor of the nominees on the Democratic ticket, so far as heard from, meets with a universal response of gratitude from the voters of Hog'em precinct and vicinity, and especially does the subscriber wish it understood that besides other American citizens who have not turned renegades yet are left a few who like myself are proud to say "I am an IRISHMAN."

FROM BLACKFOOT.

A friend hands us a letter received last week from a brother at Helena. He was formerly a resident of this place, and his views concerning Montana may be considered good authority.

HELLEN A, June 11, 1866.

"You seem to think that I look at the dark side of the country—well it may be so and I truly hope it is, but should you take the trouble to come here you will find I would not take that which I have written is true. I want to ask you are those that uniformly give a favorable account of this country; I can tell you, I know one who is now located at McClellan Gulch selling goods, who has been there last fall, that this was the best mining country he ever saw, and what has become of him? He brought \$5000 or \$6000 worth of goods to this country, and assuming the theory I suppose that this was a good country, he shaped his course accordingly and to-day he cannot command five hundred dollars. Billy Edwards left his flour with him last fall. He sold it and now he cannot get the money for it. Mallett also I suppose blowed his horn vastly; why did he not ship goods here this spring? He has closed out and left the Territory.

To sum it all up I tell you that this is not a good country; it falls far short of what I anticipated and I intend to get out of it as soon as possible, though as I am here now I will make a fair trial before I quit the country—but were I in California and know what I now do about the mines of this country I would never have come to this country.

I have now been laying here eight or nine days and it has snowed or rained nearly all the time, and been cold enough to wear an overcoat. Eight months of winter, and the other four months I do not know what to call them; at least not more pleasant than a February in Northern California—yes "distance lends enchantment" and doubtless were I still further north—somewhere in the region of the North Pole—it would be far better. I have and wish still to refrain from giving advice to any one except by request, and where do I am careful not to advise in a hurry. I do believe this to be as good a mining country as aise, and as Boise fell short of California so Montana falls short of Boise.

I have formed a more favorable opinion of the Black Creek country and the country on the other side generally than this side—it looks more like a mining country. Prospecting is a very unprofitable business and I cannot afford to do it—though have a friend that has been at it for three months more and is still at it, and should he find anything I will get a good show. As to what you ask about a Sewing Machine in a place about every other house in the family, it of the town is "Dress Making and Sewing"

stack up. Reynolds City (Elk Creek) is of course a new place and such things are scarce. Should you decide to come I have a horse at Reynolds City suitable for you to live in and should you write me before I sell it I will keep it for you. When I go back to the Elk Creek country I think I will try Big Bear Gulch. Tim Ryan and the O'Brien boys are there. I saw old Jack Gilfoil at Blackfoot with a long face on; also Joe, the butcher, the one that was in the Umatilla. A. C.

Mr. GEORGE T. THOMPSON, Boise City. Dear Sir: The undersigned regrets that it becomes necessary to call your attention to the fact that forgeries have been committed in this city by the unauthorized and unlawful use of the name of the undersigned. The perpetrators of these crimes are known. Their longer presence in this community will be tolerated only on condition that the offence be not repeated. This you will observe and communicate to your fellow offenders, that they may govern themselves accordingly.

So Mr. Thompson is to be driven out of the county if he persists in using the English alphabet. The vagabonds who set up their intollerant prescription here are referred to the following from Mr. Duvall:

BOISE CITY, July 11th, 1866.
EDITOR WORLD: Dear Sir—The above notice find in the possession of one of our citizens, who, for aught I know, is guilty of no crime whatever. Now, the object of this communication is to call the attention of the XXX to the laws of the Territory, which must and shall be enforced in Ada county; at least as far as my duties as an officer are required; and to enforce them, if necessary, I will call out every citizen of the county to assist me in stopping the outrages from their assassination and bribery.

We trust Mr. Duvall will stick to the determination expressed in that letter, and execute it to the very letter. It is time the people of this Territory know who the law-makers are. They have tolerated this band of midnight assassins long enough. If the time has come when the lives, liberty and property of the best citizens in the county are to be sacrificed by a gang of masked desperadoes, herding in stone cellars, and murdering or banishing every honest man who will not participate in their damnable deeds, it is time we understood it. We hope Mr. Duvall will let the Vigilante band of scoundrels know that he is the Sheriff of that county, and that there is still law, courts and officers in existence. In maintaining law and order, he will be sustained not only by the best men in his own community, but Boise county will give him its approbation and, if necessary, something still more effective.
