City and County.

WEATHER RECORD.—We are indebted to Mr. Wm. Dean, of Walla Walla Flat, near this city, for the following statistical facts concerning the snow for successive winters in this vicinity, from and including the winter of 1864-5 to and including the present winter to March 18th: For the winter of 1864-5, 24 feet; '65-6, 9 feet; '66-7, 18 feet; '67-8, 9 feet 3 inches; '68-9, 7 feet 5 1/2 inches; '69-'70, 9 feet 1 inch. The fall for each month of each of these winters is given in the following table prepared by Mr. Bean:

During the winter of 1864-5 the snow-fall on Bannock Bar in this city, near Spring, measured seven feet in depth on the level. In Placerville, the same winter, the depth was eight feet on the Plaza. The snow of the present winter is more compact and filled with moisture than that of any previous season since the Basin has been settled. The maximum of cold in this place, for the present winter, was reached on the morning of March 14th, when the mercury, at sunrise, stood at 24 degrees below zero. Jan. 18th, at sunrise, the mercury stood at 18 degrees below zero, and on March 14th at 20 degrees below, on Walla Walla Flat. The cold "snap" of the present week was unusual for the time of year, in severity, such having occurred but once before, in March, 1867. A fierce storm of wind and snow began on Sunday and continued until Tuesday morning, when a regular old-fashioned, quiet snow-fall set in, which lasted until Tuesday night, and furnished something more than a foot of fresh snow. Wednesday the mercury rose to above freezing, and a drizzling rain set in, which continued up to the hour of going to press.

ST. PATRICK'S DAY.—To-day is the anniversary day of the patron Saint of Ireland—St. Patrick's Day. It will be celebrated by Irishmen all over the world, in commemoration of the introduction of civilization and Christianity, many centuries ago, into the Emerald Isle, since famous in the world's history for its warriors, statesmen, patriots, philosophers, scholars, martyrs, heroes, and above all for its wrongs and the oppression of a haughty foe. So true to the cause of liberty, of human freedom, is the instinctive feeling of the Irish people, that they may be found amongst the foremost champions and defenders of a liberty banished from their own loved Isle, all over the earth. That this anniversary will be duly celebrated by the Irishmen in this city and county to-day, there is no doubt. Many an eye will be moistened and many a voice tremble over memories of the land of the harp and the shamrock, to-day, all over the earth.

Brown, Esq. We opine, however, that they will all be found opening as gorgeously as the spring flowers and to the public equally as inviting.

LETTER FROM CEDAR CREEK.

The following letter, handed us by T. B. Lyons for publication, contains late, full and important news from and of the Cedar Creek mines:

FRENCHTOWN, Missoula Co., M. T., } January 30, 1870.

MR. T. B. LYONS: * * * The Cedar Creek mines were struck by two Frenchmen. They are on Cedar creek, 43 miles below this, on the west side of Missoula river. The first claims were recorded on the 3d of December last. On the 6th of Dec. I recorded claim No. 8 above the discovery, and prospected it a little. In four pans I got \$9 75. The gold is as fine in quality as any in Montana Territory. I think without a doubt there are 12 to 15 miles of Cedar creek very rich, and many tributary gulches bid fair to be good. Claims sell from \$1,000 to \$2,000, cash down. This place contains about 2,000 inhabitants, of whom quite a number are from Walla Walla, W. T. This, Frenchtown, if you remember the Commissary at old Brown's, is on the creek, one mile from Brown's. Missoula Mills are at Rattlesnake creek, near the mouth of Helgate canyon. We have already a daily line of stages from Missoula to Frenchtown, and a saddle train from there to Cedar Junction, on Cedar creek, 8 miles from its mouth. There is another town near the discovery, about 13 miles from the mouth of Cedar creek, called Louisville. In the neighborhood of the discovery the claims are from 3 to 6 feet deep, with soft bedrock. Each of the towns have 40 to 50 houses, and very good ones, too, already built. Hurdy-gurdy houses are making the most money, as the weather is very bad. Freight from here to Cedar Junction, 51 miles, is 10 cents a pound. This camp is making Helena tremble in her boots. It is believed to be the richest camp ever yet struck in this country. This you can rely on as true, and not half told. * * * Yours, truly, M. W. TINTOR.
