DEMOCRATIC CENTRAL COMMITTEE.

The Boise County Democratic Central Committee met at the Court House in Idaho City, April 2d, pursuant to call.

On motion, Wm. Lynch was elected permanent Chairman, and H. F. Sayre Secretary.

The following apportionment of Delegates to the County Convention was then made: One Delegate for each precinct at large; one for each 50 Democratic votes cast at the last general election for Delegate to Congress, and one for each fraction of 50 and over 25.

Idaho City, 8 Centerville, 3 Pine Grove, 3 Placerville, 3 Puenavista Bar, 3 Pioneer City, 4 Last Chance, 1 Granite Creek, 3 Minnehaha, 2 Horse Shoe Bend, 2 Gold Hill, 2 Deadwood, 2 Boston, 2 Squaw Creek, 1 Upper Payette, 1

Total, 39. By request, the primary election at Squaw Creek was ordered to be held at Nesbett's ranch, and at Horse Shoe Bend at Shafer's ranch.

It was thereupon ordered that the primaries be held on Saturday, April 16, 1870, and the County Convention, at Centerville, Saturday, April 23, 1870.

The following resolution was then adopted: Resolved, That all persons who are opposed to the so-called Republican party and will pledge themselves to support and vote for the nominees of the Democratic party at the ensuing election, be allowed to participate in the election for Delegates to the County Convention.

GRANITE CREEK—Con Haley, Prosper Langrie, and James McKay. PIONEER CITY—Alex. Sifers, Peter Tewey, and Columbus Davis.

UPPER PAYETTE—Thos. Scanlan, Wm. Abbott, and D. McBride. GOLD HILL—Nathan Marx, Julian Mouratt, and Wm. Schmidt.

SHAFFER'S RANCH—D. B. Mooney, Robt. Smith, and F. M. Harris. SQUAW CREEK—Wm. Zimmerman, Hans Nesmith, and Andy McQuaid.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—On Friday morning, April 1st, John Dolan, while at work on the bar claims on the west side of Elk creek for the Buena Vista Bar Company, met with an accident which resulted in his death shortly afterwards. He was engaged in picking under a bank in order to commence a cut for mining operations, when a portion of the bank caved and fell on him, inflicting internal injuries of such a nature as to cause his death in about half an hour afterwards. The deceased was a native of the town of Clara, Kings county, Ireland, aged about 40 years, and leaves a wife and child to mourn his loss. The funeral took place from the Catholic Church, on last Sunday evening, and was very largely attended, the Fenian Brotherhood, of which he was a member, turning out in force. Father Mesple officiated in the funeral services and made a few touching and appropriate remarks on the occasion.
