City and County.

THE COUNTRY NORTH.—Mr. William Hooton, who has been prospecting the country north of here, between Idaho City and Warrens, returned a few days ago and from him we learned a few items from the divide between here and Deadwood Basin as about one foot in depth. At that place Otto Grant, Geo. Wise, Geo. Matt. Calliher and another man will winter, but they are interested in claims there which have paid very well during the past season.

THE PARTY.—The party given at the Luna House, on last Monday evening, was decidedly the most pleasant affair we have attended for many months.

THE GAME.—A hunting party, consisting of Messrs. J. G. Branstetter, S. Fry and Duke McAllister, recently spent a few days in the valley in the neighborhood of Upper Squaw creek, and they brought in nine deer, which were the largest and finest we have ever seen in this market.

Mr. Robie has concluded not to punish himself by wintering in that desolate region, but Mr. Kennaly returns and will spend the winter at his claims. He informs us that four men will winter there and that they will put in their time running tunnels and preparing for the spring work.

DISTRICT COURT ADJOURNED.—The District Court, after having been in session about two weeks, adjourned, on last Saturday evening, nearly every case on the civil calendar having been disposed of, and there not being, during the entire term, a criminal case on the docket, which speaks well for the people of Boise, for once, anyhow.

ROBBED.—While Mr. and Mrs. Mathews were on their visit to Idaho City they received the unwelcome intelligence that on last Sunday or Monday night their residence in Boise City was entered by burglars, and things turned upside down generally. A little girl, who was sleeping in the house, took up Mrs. Mathews' little daughter, aged about four years, and, escaping from the window, alarmed the neighbors, but we understand that no attempt was made by them at the time to capture the thieves. We are informed that the scoundrels, not satisfied with going through the house for valuables, opened the pantry or cupboard and through sheer meanness took the jars of preserves and jellies, which were put up for winter, and threw them on the floor. The stage driver, who brought the news up to Mr. Mathews, didn't know what the thieves had carried off, and we are therefore not informed as to the loss.
