DIED:

At the residence of his father in Iowa City, Iowa, on November 10th, 1871, JOHN A. PINNEY, aged about 25 years.

The deceased was a brother of our worthy Postmaster, Mr. James A. Pinney, and resided for a time in Idaho City. He had been in delicate health for several years, being a victim to that most insidious of all diseases, consumption.

In Jonesville, on the morning of the 6th instant, ROWEN B. BURTON, aged 37 years and 4 months.

We clip the above from the Jonesville, Michigan, Independent, of November 9th, which was handed to us by Mr. Robert Tompkins, of this city, a cousin of the deceased. It contains a lengthy obituary notice, from which it appears that Mr. Burton, early in 1870, was attacked with cancer on his tongue, which gradually extended to his throat, baffling the skill of his physicians, and terminating fatally as stated above.
