WENT TO BOISE.—E. S. Marshal, Jo. Pinkham, with Surveyor-General, Cartee, left for Boise City on last Sunday; the former to be in attendance at the District Court, which commenced a session last Monday, and General Cartee on business connected with his office.

MINE ACCIDENT.—A Chinaman was caved on in a mining claim on Gold Hill, a short distance above town, a few days ago, and killed. We believe he was a member of the See Yup company.

ACCIDENTALLY KILLED.—On last Sunday William Coats, residing near Placerville, met with a dreadful accident, which resulted in his death a few hours after. He was, in company with another man, engaged in felling some timber near the foot of the "big hill," on the road between Centerville and Placerville, near Ophir creek, and they had out a large tree nearly down when they noticed that it would fall across the road, and in order to prevent its falling in that direction, Coats cut down a smaller tree in such a manner as to fall against the larger one, and thus throw it in a direction not to obstruct the stage road. The small tree when it struck the large one rebounded and the butt struck Coats on the left side with terrific force, knocking him senseless.

THE AUCTION.—The auction sale of household and kitchen furniture belonging to Mr. J. G. Bryant came off on last Thursday and Friday, quite a large crowd of bidders being in attendance.
