

GUANO.—We have received three bags of this valuable manure from Chili. With the exception of a small quantity reserved to experiment with on plants and trees, it has been sent to Koloa and Hanelei, Kauai, to test its fertilising properties on the sugar and coffee plantations. Rivero states that the crop of potatoes in Peru is increased 45 times by its application, and that of maize 35 times. In Arica, where much pepper is cultivated, each plant is manured three times: first upon the appearance of its roots, second that of the leaves, and lastly upon the formation of the fruit.—*Humboldt*. In corn it is said a small amount is sprinkled on each hill. Guano not only contains ammoniacal salts in abundance, but those other inorganic constituents so necessary for the development of plants. Völpel gives the following analysis:—

Under the government of the Incas, Guano was considered so valuable, that a punishment was inflicted on any one found destroying the fowl in the Guano Islands.—Overseers were appointed for their further protection. With such care, and on a coast where no rain falls, it is not surprising that great accumulation of excrements should have taken place. Under the present system of exportation, the birds will be frightened away and the quantity rapidly decrease.

The arbitrators appointed by the parties concerned in the case of salvage of the whale-ship *Wilmington* and *Liverpool Packet*, have awarded \$100 each to the pilots for their services, and one quarter of ship, and cargo to the amount saved by him, to M. Kekuanaoa.

We have no late news by the *Mariposa*; she brings but few files of papers.

FOREIGN MISCELLANY.

THE SANDWICH ISLAND COMMISSION.—Messrs. Haalilio and Richards, Commissioners of His Majesty of the Sandwich Islands, visited on Saturday last, and were received on board the ship-of-war *North Carolina* and at the Navy Yard with a national salute, and every attention due to their high character as the representatives of an independent nation. Yesterday they visited Fort Hamilton and were treated with due consideration.—This is right. The Sandwich Islanders are a civilized and Christian people; and now recognised by Britain, France, Belgium and the United States, as belonging to the great family of nations.—*N. Y. Tribune, June 21.*

From the *Burbadoes Globe, May 2d.*

HIGHLY IMPORTANT NEWS.—The last island steamer brings the following astonishing intelligence, received from Tahiti by way of Panama, that Queen Pomare having taken refuge on board the British frigate *Dublin*, the French Admiral (*Du Petit Thouars*) proceeded thither and peremptorily demanded the surrender of the Queen's person from the British captain. This was of course refused, high words arose between the French admiral and English captain, and the former left for his own vessel furious with indignation. He immediately commanded the three large men-of-war he had with him in the bay, to clear for action. They all assailed the British frigate with a murderous, sustained and simultaneous fire.—The British fought to the last, and sunk with colors flying.

[Probably a hoax.]—Very likely.

WHITEWASH.—IT IS NOW THE SEASON.—There is nothing which so much improves the appearance of a house and the premises, as painting and whitewashing the tenements and fences. The following recipes for whitewashing have been found by experience to answer the same purpose on wood, brick, and stone, as oil-paint, and are much cheaper. The first is the recipe used for the President's house at Washington, improved by further experiments. The second is a simpler and cheaper one, which the writer has known to succeed in a variety of cases, lasting as long and looking as well as white oil-paint.

Recipe.—Take half a bushel of unslacked lime, and slack it with boiling hot water, covering it during the process. Strain it, and add a peck of salt dissolved in warm water, three pounds of ground rice boiled to a thin paste, put in boiling hot; half a pound of powdered Spanish whiting; and a pound of clear glue, dissolved in warm water. Mix, and let it stand several days. Then keep it in a kettle on a portable furnace, and put it on as hot as possible, with a painter's or whitewash brush.

Another.—Make whitewash in the usual way, except that the water used should have two double handfuls of salt dissolved in each pailful of the hot water used. Then stir in a double handful of fine sand, to make it thick, like cream. This is better to be put on hot. Coloring matter can be added to both, making a light stone color, a cream color, or a light buff, which are most suitable for buildings.

After leaving the river she visited the North West Coast, as far north as Simpson's Bay, in 55°, thence she touched at St. Francisco and Monterey.

WHALE-SHIPS supplied with PROVISIONS on the most reasonable terms of the port, for Bills on the United States, or for goods adapted to the market.

The Commerce of California is increasing; the Farmers preparing to furnish Provisions in more abundance; the Port Charges but Four Dollars for a whale-ship—that may not want to barter goods for provisions—and Thirty Dollars for those who may wish to; the Government, by decree of October 1844, having granted the privilege to captains of whale-ships to sell goods to a sufficient amount for their supplies, by paying duties on the goods actually sold.

Wood can be procured in Monterey. Wells are being built near the beach, with pipes to conduct water to the boats. The climate is mild; vessels never carry away a sick crew,—and can, in the autumnal months, in common season, obtain provisions and leave port in two weeks.—Letters can be sent—via Mazatlan—to the United States (at times) in from sixty to seventy days.
