Rocks not laid down on the Charts. Capt. Nye, of the Am. whaler Mount Vernon, has furnished us with the following observations, which we publish for the benefit of the shipping community.

On my passage from the Bonin Islands to the Japan Sea, in April last, I passed between Pinaco Island, (lat. 29° 44' N., long. 130° 10' E.) and Jakanima. This passage has the appearance, on the charts, of being a safe and easy one, but there are two clusters of pointed and rugged rocks, of some 30 or 40 in each, lying about mid-way of the passage, distant one mile from each other, and each cluster about half a mile long. They lay N. E. and S. W., directly in the track of vessels passing in or out. They are from five to forty feet above water, and are not laid down on any charts I have seen.

There is no doubt that the field of observation to be traversed by the U. S. Surveying Squadron, now in those waters, is one of great importance to be explored, and of which the charts in use by the whaling fleet are necessarily defective, from the fact that close and systematic surveys have never been made, except upon some of the most important routes. But these defects are likely to be remedied as soon as the correct data can be obtained, which is accumulating every month by the labors of the squadron.

Capt. Ringgold, who has been informed, with a view to place them at the disposal of the bureau in Washington at the earliest moment, so that the result of their explorations, as far as completed, might be brought into immediate use. Continuing to furnish charts in this way as fast as procured, correct charts of particular sections will be issued from time to time, to be combined, ultimately, into a perfect series, for the benefit of the world afloat of all nations.

New Sugar Crop.

By the last steamer from Kaula a few tons of sugar from the new crop of Lihue Plantation was received by Aldrich & Bishop, agents in Honolulu for the plantation, and by whom the entire crop will be offered for sale as it comes in.

The samples received are good specimens of the yellow muscovado, of a bright color and good grain, and will find a ready sale in the market. The crop this year will be from 150 to 200 tons, besides the molasses which is of excellent quality.

At Koloa, also, and on Maui, the new crop is being ground, and, with the assistance of the centrifugal separator, will soon be in the market. The amount made this year will be considerable; increasing on the last year's crop on some of the plantations, and yielding about the same on others. But all that will be raised will be but a tithe of what the islands can produce, or for which there is a market at home. Lands now idle that would produce both sugar and coffee, but capital and enterprise are wanted to render them productive; and here is a field that can hardly be overworked, and a branch of industry, that can scarcely be overdone. Would there were ten plantations for sugar and coffee where there is now one, for it is these that furnish an export which in no respect interferes with any other source of wealth.

The Arrival of the British Squadron at San Francisco.

The Chronicle, of Oct. 30th, says:—As the President came in yesterday morning, she saluted Admiral Des Pointes with 13 guns, and the Forte replied with 14. From the British officers whom we have seen, we could learn little new with regard to the affair at Petropolski. They give credit to the French for the manner in which they covered the retreat after the disastrous attempt to take the town by land.

Of the English engaged, 59 killed and 137 wounded, of whom a number died subsequently. The Virago steamer received some dangerous shot holes. One in her stern was so large that she made thirteen inches of water in five minutes. On board the Virago is Pt. Capt. Forsythe, acting lieutenant, who was promoted at the request of the U. S. Government, for having been instrumental in saving the lives of Lieut. Strain and his party last spring.

The Russian bark Sitka, prize to the President, had arrived at San Francisco; and ere this, the frigate Amphitrite has joined the British Squadron, of which the commander, Capt. Frederick, will be senior officer, since the death of Admiral Price.

Coroner's Verdict.

The occasion of the sudden death, as given below by the verdict of a Coroner's Jury, will no doubt be the means of directing attention to the subject of fast riding in our streets, and of committing the charge of horses to irresponsible boys, to ride or drive furiously through crowded thoroughfares. Both practices are dangerous, and should be discontinued.

In addition to the death of the boy in question, the same persons, on the same occasion, knocked down a man, who was considerably injured by the violence he received from the reckless manner in which the "native boys" urged their drove of horses along in the dark, regardless of the lives and limbs of persons who might be in the way. It is greatly to be regretted that the guilty persons cannot be identified and punished, to the utmost extent of the law.

CONSTITUTION OF THE HONOLULU SAILOR'S HOME SOCIETY. Art. 1. The name of this Society shall be "The Honolulu Sailor's Home Society." Art. 2. The object of this Society shall be to improve the moral, social and religious condition of Seamen resorting to this Port, by promoting the establishment and maintenance of a Home, of good character, from which all intoxicating liquors shall be excluded, and in such other ways as shall be deemed proper.
