LATER FOREIGN NEWS.



By the arrival, on Monday last, of the clipper ship  
*Fair Wind*, Capt. Crowell, in 8 days 17 hours from  
San Francisco, we have received that city's journals to the  
12th inst., containing telegraphed news from the  
East, to December 28th from St. Louis, and December 16  
from Queenstown, Ireland, and Australian papers to Octo-  
ber 12th.

The passage of the *Fair Wind* is the quickest ever put  
on record between this place and San Francisco. By  
it we are in receipt of European news only 36 days old,  
and 24 days from the Eastern States.

The news from the United States continues interest-  
ingly gloomy. The secession movement is rather increas-  
ing and gaining moral strength from the numerous de-  
fections among the Southerners and the wavering atti-  
tude of the North. The President having enunciated the  
doctrine (correctly or not, it is not ours to say) that a  
seceding State could not constitutionally be coerced into  
the Union, South Carolina is emboldened to persevere,  
and is apparently improving her time between now and  
the 4th of March to organize her resources and mature  
the plan of that Southern Confederacy or consolidated  
Republic which seems the inevitable consequence of the  
secession of the Cotton States.

That the United States are now in an "awful fix," to  
use their own vernacular, no sensible man can deny.  
But it is not a visitation of God or a stroke of Provi-  
dence, but has been coming for years, and is the work  
of man, of principle juggling politicians, North and  
South, and of clerical manipulation.

We cannot, however, yet reconcile ourselves to the  
idea of a dissolution of the Union. The time has surely  
not yet come. It is a fearful crisis to contemplate, but  
we have still hope in the naturally robust constitution  
of the patient. Already indignation meetings have been  
held in the North, and men who would not care for  
Southern rights begin to see the folly of their acts when  
loss of employment and starvation bleach the cheeks of  
wives and children.

From the *Alta California* and *Evening Bulletin* we  
pick the following in reference to the political ague-fit  
of the United States:  
The *Unionist's* despatch from St. Louis, December 27  
and 28, says:  
Fort Moultrie was evacuated last night. The guns  
were spiked and gun-carriages set on fire. Only four  
soldiers were left in charge, the others were conveyed to  
Fort Sumpter. The movement created intense excite-  
ment in Charleston. The secessionist movement went  
into secret session, an attempt having first been made to  
secure officers from the Government to resign the office.  
Major Anderson states that he executed Fort Moultrie in or-  
der to allay the discussion about it, and, at the same  
time, strengthen his own position.

The Convention, in a secret session, passed an ordi-  
nance on the 20th, appointing the present Federal as-  
sistant Secretary of the Treasury to resign the office.  
Federal Government—the Government to fill vacancies.  
Federal revenue laws are made State laws. All reve-  
nues hereafter to be collected, deducting expenses, are to  
be paid into the State Treasury, for the use of the  
State, subject to the order of the Convention or of the  
General Assembly; and the officers are required to retain  
Federal property subject to the disposal of the State,  
which will account to the United States.  
Rebels submitted an ordinance for a Convention of  
Southern States, at Montgomery, Ala., to form a Southern  
Confederacy.

The foreign ships in port are now to linger under clear-
