

people, all threaten with more danger than ever the very safety of our colonization. Instead of fighting the natives we have opened a military school of which the natives have been taking lessons, and have shown their proficiency to the astonishment and sometimes to the imminent danger of their instructors.

We do not think it necessary now to go into the question whether the natives are to be treated as described by the Bishop, or whether it is precisely as described by the Governor. For our own part we have no doubt, after a scrupulous examination of all the evidence, that the case must go against the natives—that it must go against them upon their own law as well as upon the essential and unchangeable principles of civilization.

There are several momentous considerations which ought to press upon the consideration of the Home Government. The first is the accumulation of such force as shall enable a powerful body to act without having to take charge of its rear or defend the towns and camps from attacks from the country.

Another essential measure seems to be the occupation of the country by military colonists. This was always the policy of ancient times in similar circumstances. They did not convert the citizen into the soldier but the soldier into the citizen.

It may be said that, rather than encounter all this expense, it will be better to abandon the country. But to whom is it to be abandoned? Are we to renounce the duties on account of the cost of sovereignty? Are we to throw into the hands of a foreign power a dangerous dominion over the native inhabitants? In the present age, it is not a matter of choice with great nations whether they will incur responsibility and bear expense.

Unless they are prepared to march against us and to maintain their ground in the world, they must fall to the rear of other and more enterprising nations. England cannot abandon New Zealand without confessing that she has attained the limits of empire, and that she has relinquished the noble task of civilizing the world to other and far less scrupulous nations.
