## ANNUAL MEETING OF KILAUEA SUGAR

At the annual meeting of the stockholders and the subsequent meeting of the directors of the Kilauea Sugar Plantation Company in San Francisco the following directorate and officers were elected: A. B. Spreckels, president; John D. Spreckels, vice president; W. D. K. Gibson, treasurer; W. H. Thompson, secretary; and John D. Spreckels, Jr. The net proceeds from 5424½ tons of sugar at \$57.53 per ton was \$312,714. Assessments Nos. 6 and 7 produced \$200,000, and other income brought the total receipts of the year 1913 to \$12,943. The total expenses of the year, plus betterments, were \$388,671, and plantation supplies and advances bring the total expended during 1913 to \$399,012. The remainder, \$113,931, was applied to the reduction of the overdraft. An overdraft of only \$195,701 remained on December 31, 1913, after this payment.

### Latest Outside News

Washington, March 9—In a speech in the Senate today, Senator Fall, of New Mexico, made a formal demand for intervention in Mexico.

Sacramento, March 9—Armed with pickhandles and heavy clubs, special officers and deputy sheriffs hastily sworn in, today scattered an army of 1,500 unemployed men, largely of the vagrant type, driving the majority of them across the river into Yolo County.

Waco, Texas, March 9—Sixty thousand bales of cotton were destroyed today in a warehouse fire, the loss being \$500,000.

Laredo, Texas, March 9—A force of Americans crossed the Mexican border today and brought back the body of Clemente Vergara, whom it had been charged was mutilated by Mexican murderers. Vergara was an American citizen. The Governor of Texas has denied that the raiders were Texas rangers.

Vera Cruz, Mexico, March 9—Despite every attempt to keep the facts secret it developed Saturday that arrangements have been made here to arm all Americans in Mexico City for their own defense in event of an uprising in the capitol.

Washington, March 9—Sir Cecil Arthur Spring-Rice, British Ambassador to the United States, informed Secretary of State Bryan yesterday that an Englishman named Syndau has been driven from his ranch near Chihuahua and that his property is in danger of destruction. Bryan has telegraphed Consul Letcher to investigate.

Honolulu—Judge Cooper has resigned from the Circuit bench as of March 6, and will shortly leave for Palmyra Island. It is rumored that C. W. Ashford may be appointed to the vacancy.

School warrants will have to be registered until after May, owing to lack of money in that fund.

The district of Kakaako is in quarantine on account of the prevalence of diphtheria.

Charles Ash, a chemist, has invented a process for extracting sugar syrup from the waste of pineapples, the syrup to be used in canning pines.

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
