## FILLIPINO KILLED ON KILAUEA R. R.

A Filipino jumped from a moving hand-car on the plantation railway at Kilauea yesterday afternoon, went over a trestle and landed forty feet below. Death followed shortly after.

Three Portuguese and four Filipinos were riding on the car. They were going at a high speed, and when near the trestle it was noticed that a stick of wood was lying across the track. It was too late to stop, so the car struck the timber, knocking it off; but in the excitement the Filipino leapt from the car, and went down into the gulch a few feet ahead.

A suspicion that the timber was put on the track maliciously caused an investigation by Sheriff Rice. It was found, however, that it had fallen from a train which had passed that way only a short time before.

Deputy Sheriff Werner is holding an inquest today and the finding will likely be as above stated.

## BUTCHER SHOP TO OFFICE BUILDING

The building at the entrance to the new county building, at one time used as a butcher shop, will be remodelled, renovated and will hereafter be used for office purposes. Work of altering the structure and placing it in neat and attractive shape will begin at once. S. E. Hannestad, lawyer, will occupy the building, he moving to it from his present location across the street.

The harness shop building, next to the butcher shop, will be moved down to a position behind THE GARDEN ISLAND office.

It is expected that the locality around the entrance to the county building will be neatly cleaned and primped up, so that entire neighborhood will be pleasing to the eye.

## LIHUE AND KAPAA MEET ON DIAMOND

The Lihue baseball team was shown its weaknesses on Sunday when it came up against the aggregation from Kawaihau, and went down to defeat to the tune of 12 to 5 in a practice game. The game was played on the Lihue diamond, and a similar practice game will probably be played between the same teams on the Kawaihau field next Sunday. Lihue's weakness is chiefly in the lack of a competent pitching staff. Afong failed to show up, and a large number of hits were made off both Robertson and Morrow. The game was slow and practically featureless. Hits and errors were plentiful on both sides. It is to be hoped that both teams, and especially the Lihue team, will manage to pull themselves together before the commencement of the League games on the 17th.



## APPROVAL OF NEW COUNTY BUILDING

The Kauai Loan Fund Commission met last Tuesday and conditionally approved the new county building, as voted in THE GARDEN ISLAND on last day. Following is a full report of the meeting, as prepared by the secretary:

Meeting called to order by Chairman H. F. Wishard. Present: Francis Gray, A. Menzies and W. D. Ripley. Absent: J. H. Davis and C. B. Gray.

Minutes of the previous meeting read and upon motion duly approved.

### REPORT OF THE ARCHITECTS

The Architect reported that the meeting called at the request of the Contractors, Messrs. Lord-Young Engineering Co., was held on Tuesday, May 5, 1914, at 10 o'clock, A. M., in the office of the Architect, at the County Building, at Lihue, Kauai. The meeting was held in the presence of the following: Mr. J. H. Davis, Inspector of Buildings, at the County Building, at Lihue.

Mr. Davis advised that he had on May 4, 1914, called at the request of the Contractors, Messrs. Lord-Young Engineering Co., to inspect the building and which would be remedied by the contractors. After further explanation he recommended to the board their acceptance of the building, conditionally, that these certain minor defects be remedied forthwith and that the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1000.) be held out from final payment until they had been completed to the satisfaction of the Architects as representing the board.

Mr. Skinner as representing the contractors said that the defects were as apparent to him as they were to Mr. Davis and assured the board that they would be immediately remedied; he agreed to the conditions as stipulated of the holding out of the sum of \$1000, until the work was completed to the satisfaction of the Architects and further agreed to the payment of the salary of the Inspector for the month of April and to the payment of the amount of office rent as extended by the County of Kauai during the month, in the amount of \$40.

### MOTION TO ACCEPT

The following motion being duly seconded was passed unanimously by the board: "That the Kauai Loan Fund Commission accept from the contractors, Messrs. Lord-Young Engineering Co., the County Building, as constructed by them under their contract with the Commission, CONDITIONALLY, that certain work just under discussion, be completed to the satisfaction of the Architects, Messrs. Ripley & Davis as representing the Commission and that the sum of \$1000, be held out from final payment pending the completion and acceptance of the said work."

### INSPECTOR

The Secretary was instructed to notify the Inspector that his services would no longer be required by the Kauai Loan Fund Commission, the County Building having been accepted, conditionally, by the said Commission.

### FURNITURE AND FIXTURES

The Lord-Young Engineering Co., being the lowest bidder for the supplying of the furniture and fixtures for the County Building as advertised according to law, were awarded the contract upon the following motion duly seconded and passed unanimously:

"That the bid of the Lord-Young Engineering Co. of \$3684, for the supplying of the furniture and fixtures for the County Building as duly advertised, be accepted and that the board enter into a written contract with them for same." The matter of the drawing up of a satisfactory contract was left in the hands of the Architects, Messrs. Ripley & Davis.

### PAYMENT OF BILLS

Upon motion duly seconded the following bill was approved and ordered paid:

Upon motion duly seconded the meeting adjourned subject to the call of the chair.

## DAILY WIRELESS NEWS TO THE GARDEN ISLAND

Honolulu—Superintendent of Education Kinney is making an inspection of the schools on Oahu. He will probably visit Kauai next.

—John Costa was arrested on arrival of Sierra from San Francisco. Representing himself to be John Silva, of Honolulu, he wrote the latter's mother and secured money, as her son, to pay his transportation to the Islands.

—The Woman's Auxiliary of the Outrigger Club has voted not to amalgamate with the men's organization.

—Miss Margaret Frances Maroni, pioneer missionary and teacher, died yesterday.

—The sugar crop of the Islands is now estimated at 600,000 tons.

—Judge Cooper has resigned as regent of the College of Hawaii.

—John Cassidy and Mrs. Cressy had a battle over the pier built in front of their property at Waikiki, and the former was arrested for assault and battery.

Vera Cruz—A woman, said to have killed eight of the seventeen Americans lost in the fighting at Vera Cruz by snipping them from a roof has been captured and will answer today to a charge of murder. General Zapatas has issued a proclamation that he will begin an attack on the City of Mexico today. John Holburn, American consular agent, is held in jail by General Mass and is threatened with death today. General Velasco, dissatisfied with the treatment he has received from the Mexican government, threatens to lead a revolt against Huerta.

City Of Mexico—(This is not clear) American representative has arrived and has been turned over to Brazilian Minister and ordered out of Mexico. He will be sent to United States as early as possible.

Washington—Mediators have withdrawn invitations to Carranza to participate in further negotiations for peace. Huerta has named Rambassa and Calindo, the third to be named later. Carranza wants information as to nature of conference, whether it is limited to the controversy between the United States and Mexico and settlement, or if it includes settlement of internal difficulties.

—The cruiser Washington has been ordered to Santo Domingo where foreigners are reported to be in danger in consequence of the bombardment of Puerto Plata.

Denver—Legislature met today to consider strike situation. Remore that Governor Ammons may be impeached.
