### A Lesson The War Teaches



Historians and moralists and those who pile up statistics are all telling us of the failures of various kinds the resent war teaches. One tells us that it shows the failure of Christianity. Another that it proves the failure of socialism, and still another that it rings the knell of the monarchical form of government.

Whether we agree with these critics of the situation or not, what they say is rather apt to set us studying the matter for ourselves more thoroughly and deeply than we otherwise would. And since this cataclysm has happened, the more searching we look into its cause, the better for the future of the world. We all felt so sure another big war could not occur that we grew careless. We should make sure now that it never does occur again and every one of us should work toward that end.

That the present war is evidence of the failure of Christianity, many even of our foremost writers and preachers are contending. But is it a failure of Christianity, or is it a showing up of the hollowness of the Christianity that is preached and practiced today? If the love and brotherhood that Christ taught were in every one's heart, irrespective of race or nationality, and if it were lived in individual, business and national life, would the present war be raging?

Is not the present war rather an evidence of how far we have wandered from Christianity and into what sham and hollowness in the matter of religion we have fallen, rather than a proof of the failure of Christianity? Doesn't it bring out in sharp contrast true Christianity and the Christianity we are practising?

As to its being a failure of socialism, socialism can hardly be said to be on trial. Socialism has made great progress in some of the countries at war, but it is by no means the dominant party. It is not running things. If socialism had been in the chair and its voice had been the one to declare for war, then indeed might one say it was a proof of the failure of socialism. But a few of us, even though we may have no liking for socialism, would believe that had the socialists been running the governments involved in the present struggle that they would have declared for war. Had the socialists been governing these countries, one feels safe in prophesying there would not now be half a million corpses strewn the fields of Europe, as many more maimed and wounded men, suffering untold physical agony, an equal number of widows, fatherless children and everywhere wrecked homes, ruined towns, paralyzed industries.

But does this war not prove the truth of the third contention—the failure of the present form of government? As one of the modern writers puts it, "After nearly two thousand years of government in Europe expressing in various ways the one idea, if this is all it has to show, is it not a complete failure?" Is not a government that brings such appalling wreckage almost overnight upon its people, a failure? If the possibility of such a happening as the present is in it, like a virulent germ, isn't this in itself a seed of failure?

And so as we study this war—and it is helpful to study the big question of humanity and statesmanship involved even though we may not want to fill our minds with the horrifying details of it—let us study it impartially. Let us look at the naked facts of it. Let us not veil them with tradition or custom or conventionality. Let us see them for what they are and let us put them in contrast with the plain every-day needs and rights of humanity. For thus we may help forward a government in our own country that shall make war impossible.

### PINKHAM FAVORS THE IRWIN SITE

Governor Pinkham sent the following message to the Legislature regarding a "Civic Center" for Honolulu:

"To the Legislature, Territory of Hawaii.

"Gentlemen:—Were I not intensely solicitous for the development of the City of Honolulu into a beautiful city, worthy to represent and accentuate the charms nature has bestowed on these islands, and to have the lawful representatives of the people of Hawaii use their power and influence in behalf of such a city, this message would never have been presented to you.

"In every ambitious city, farsighted, unselfish, progressive citizens of character and force are endeavoring to establish notable Civic Centers, each for his own city.

"The time is immediately at hand when Honolulu and the Territory should endeavor to influence the federal authorities to decide whether this city is to have a notable civic center.

"If it fails now, it can never be worthily so provided.

#### Would Increase Area

"The very nature of our situation and limitations point to but one location, to wit, that area which on the mauka side is already occupied with appropriate public buildings, the Capitol, the Archives, the Library of Hawaii, and the mauka side from Punchbowl to Richards streets, a part of which is already occupied by the judiciary building, and it is to be hoped will be further occupied by the federal building on the Irwin site. The corner from the judiciary grounds to Punchbowl street should be acquired. The city hall should occupy the 'gorc' site where Merchant and King streets meet.

"The administration, so far as it is within its power assured the recent board of supervisors and would, if requested, assure the present board of supervisors of its earnest cooperation in securing that site for them. It, however,

indulged in a hope no action would be taken until the site of the federal building was determined, and its style of architecture, so that the city hall might be made architecturally harmonious, if it should become a part of Honolulu's civic center.

#### Should Oppose Selfishness

"To me the most discouraging feature is the selfishness disclosed, and should my suggestions be acceptable to you, I trust that you may find means to counteract such selfishness.

"A prominent gentleman said to me, 'Governor, personally I favor the Irwin site as the only logical one that can both convenience the public and best beautify the city, but, professionally, I favor the site that will afford me a commission or fee.'

"I beg to quote the following cablegram:

"Washington, D. C. Feb. 27, 1915  
"Governor Pinkham, Honolulu  
"Federal Building bill now goes to President. Conference report agreed to by both houses.  
"KALANIANOLE."

"I desire not to force my opinions on you, but believe it to be my duty to transmit to you all information, trusting in your wisdom and public spirit for such prompt action as you may determine appropriate."

### Lota's Wharf Bill

Following is the section which Representative Lota's Bill 60, in the House, seeks to add to the law relating to landing pier, wharves and sheds.

"Section 512A. Any person or persons who shall prevent or shall become the cause of any preventing of anyone in going to and coming from any landing, pier, wharves, or shed, in the Territory of Hawaii, belonging to the Government, at the arrival and leaving of any vessels, shall be punished by a fine of not exceeding Five Hundred dollars or by imprisonment of not exceeding One Year or both in the discretion of the Court."
