

WILLETT & GRAY ON SUGAR MARKET

The following are extracts from the latest report of Willett & Gray, the New York sugar experts:

Influenced by a steady and continuous demand for refined sugars, both locally and for export, the market has continued strong and advancing.

Last week cost and freight quotations were 4 3/8c for prompt, 4 1/2c for April and 4 1/2c for May shipment. The strength of the market is shown in the fact that the advances made were in eighths, one day from 5.39c to 5.52c to 5.64c to 5.77c to 5.89c, or totaling an advance of 50 points for the week now.

Porto Riccos sold March 16 at lot 5.64c, an advance of 37 points. Philadelphia paid 5.71c for Porto Riccos.

Full-duty sugars have also been active and at advancing prices, last sales being at 4 3/4c c. i. f. New York. Perus and San Domingos comprise the chief sales.

Among the recent sales of raws were purchases by European operators of 12,000 tons Cubas for immediate, March and April shipments to cover purchases of granulated for export. The prices paid for these raw sugars were 5.72c to 5.72c and 5.77c.

At the close the market was very strong, with sales at 5.89c for March and April Cubas, and with holders asking 6.02c for any position.

The Atlantic port figures continue to show large meltings (70,000 tons) and with receipts only about sufficient to cover the meltings (72,526) the refiner's stocks are not able to increase materially.

Foreign Situation

Our regular monthly cable gives Java exports in February of 45,000 tons, all to Asiatic ports. The latest exports to Europe were in October, 1915.

Belgium production of the 1915-16 campaign is placed at 120,000 tons, while the stock at the end of the campaign year is placed at about 53,000 tons together 173,000 tons, whereas requirements are figured about 200,000 tons. The deficit could be imported from Holland, but the Dutch export values are above the maximum prices allowed in Belgium by the German authorities.

France has arranged to pay beet factories \$9.65 (at the par of exchange) per ton for beets for the coming campaign.

In Russia only fifteen of the fifty-four beet factories are in

working order, and the production of these fifteen factories is less than one-quarter of the usual annual consumption.

Cuban Trade Bullish

The weekly cabled figures were bullish, receipts being 134,049 tons or 24,830 tons less than those of last week. The total exports, 57,854 tons, were comparatively small, 13,326 tons being consigned to Europe, and according to Mr. Himley, 12,000 tons to New Orleans, leaving only 42,528 tons for the United States Atlantic ports, which is only about one-half a week's meltings at the rate that the Atlantic refiners have been working lately.

Stocks in the Island are increased considerably, in consequence, and now stand at 535,350 tons, against 384,000 tons last year. On March 13 there were 183 centrals grinding, compared with 174 corresponding date last year. Visible production to March 11 was 1,373,460 tons, against 964,715 tons last year and 1,177,352 tons in 1914.

Latest cable advices covering the weather in the Island for the week state that rains have occurred in the western province, which is more favorable than the previously existing dry weather conditions.

HILO'S OFFICERS' CLUB.

An officers club of the commanders of the 2nd Infantry was organized last week, with Colonel J. D. Easton elected as its president. Captain Allan Rowatt was elected secretary and treasurer, Major Morehead, Captain Caceres and Lieutenant Cushingham were appointed as a committee to draft rules, regulations, by-laws and a constitution. It is the intention of the officers to later secure a club room, but for the present headquarters will be made at the armory. Much of the club's activities will be devoted to arranging and inspiring social affairs for the entertainment of the officers and their friends.
