

# WHAT CONGRESS HAS DONE FOR US

Washington, D. C. July 13—In both volume and importance of legislation for Hawaii this has been one of the most successful Congressional sessions since the annexation of the Territory.

Three classes of legislation for the Hawaiian Islands have been secured at the hands of Congress. The first is a class of general bills such as that confirming certain powers of the Public Utilities Commission over public service corporations; one giving enlarged jurisdiction to the Board of Harbor Commissions is another of this class. Still another, specially urged by the Honolulu Chamber of Commerce, is the act transferring to the County treasuries the payments made by public service corporations of a percentage of their gross receipts.

The second class of legislation secured is that of bills confirming original or extending existing franchises to public utility corporations. The extent to which these have been advanced and enacted has caused some shudders to those members of Congress who look askance at anything akin to a franchise, however restricted.

Bills have already been signed by the President confirming the Kauai Electric franchise, and extending the operative areas of the Island Electric Company on Maui, the Hawaiian Electric and the Honolulu Gas Company on Oahu.

These latter include a new provision giving the public Utilities Commission power to order extensions of service under reasonable conditions. The principle embodied in that provision, and possibly its exact form, will probably be used by Congress in similar bills for years to come.

A gas franchise for Hilo has also passed the House, but action on it by the Senate Committee has been delayed by a cabled request of Governor Pinkham. The bill to extend the Hilo Street Railroad franchise has been favorably reported.

The third class of legislation secured consists of appropriations and bills that insure future appropriations, or provide some desirable development within the territory. The first of these is the bill creating the Hawaii National Park. This measure is now in conference, and will become a law before the close of the session.

In the River and Harbor bill a quarter of a million dollars was secured for the Kahului west breakwater, in the face of a rule adopted by the House Committee to exclude all new projects; the final acceptance of this project by the House conferees was the favorable climax of five months' persistent work.

For Honolulu Harbor \$106,000 was appropriated. It is believed that this, together with any balance that may remain of the funds now available for completing the old Honolulu project, can be readily re-appropriated at the next session of Congress for the new Kalihi channel project, and perhaps pave the way to secure with it an additional quarter million dollars for that needed improvement. The sum of \$60,000 has also been voted for a lighthouse station at Honolulu.

One of the most difficult and involved pieces of legislation that has ever been attempted for Hawaii was the bill to provide for military roads on the Island of Oahu.

The original bill, as drafted in Honolulu was sharply criticised and adversely reported on by the secretary of war. This made necessary not merely the drafting of a new bill, but a series of conferences with the War College, the Chief of Engineers, the General Staff, and the Secretary of War, in order to get the War Department thoroughly committed to the new measure.

This was done so successfully

that a favorable report was secured from the Secretary of War and a special estimate of \$1,000,000 was sent to Congress for a system of military roads on Oahu.

The personal attendance of General Carter and General Maccomb, the head of the War College, was also secured before the Committee of both House and Senate. However, an insuperable barrier was met in the fact that the Military Department of Hawaii had never officially recommended these military roads, nor prepared surveys for their location and estimate of costs. The utmost that could be done, therefore, was to secure an appropriation of \$10,000 to provide for these surveys.

It is probably that when these surveys, officially ordered by Congress, or completed, if equally thorough work is done on this measure at the next session, the appropriation can be secured.

The bill to provide retirement pay for Judge Dole is on the House calendar, and its passage may be reached soon. All of the items regularly submitted for military purposes in Hawaii have been included in the supply bills.

It has become a matter of comment about the House and Senate that Hawaii is getting more legislation this year than any other territory or state, and it is fair to say that the work done for Hawaii at this session may be written down as one of the most successful in the record of the territorial period.

Personal talks with the men who have had a part in Hawaiian affairs at Washington this year, shows them all agreed that this degree of success has been made possible by the friendly attitude of members and senators toward the Islanders, and particularly through their willingness to do any reasonable favor for Delegate Kalaniana'ole who is personally well liked both in the House and Senate.

Delegate Kalaniana'ole has been assisted in his work for the Territory by his secretary, John R. Desha, and by Mr. George McClellan, who has a large Congressional acquaintance and thorough familiarity with Hawaiian affairs.

Monthly reports must be forwarded to headquarters no later than the 8th, day of the month, for the previous month. As the Reg. Report must be made out and be in the Adj. Gen. hands by the 2nd, week of the month and as the pay of all enlisted men and com. officers depend entirely on these reports company commanders will realize the importance of the above.
