Berlin—British attacks on the Somme failed with heavy losses and their thrust is at a standstill. The Allies are improving their positions.

The retreat of the Bulgarians from Monastir is under the direction of Philip de Bacle. The Allies are pursuing. Monastir was practically destroyed by the Teutons.

#### Navy Short Of Men

Washington—Target practice on the first line of fighting ships in the winter maneuvers has been limited to one half on account of the lack of men. This statement was made to the House Naval Committee by Admiral Strauss today.

Honolulu—A Japanese fell from a mountain cliff back of Honolulu and is dead. He had traced his name in the sand, and the body was later found.

Advices from Victoria report the death of Captain Frederic Dunbar Walker, of "Wandering Minstrel" and "Norma" fame. Captain Walker was well known in the Pacific twenty to thirty years ago, but of late years had lived quietly in Honolulu. He left here in June for a health tour.

The First Infantry, N. G. H., entered camp yesterday at Red Hill.

Esther Hickey, a young part-Hawaiian girl, was drowned in the freshet of Makiki stream while playing with two little boys Saturday. The children gave the alarm too late, the body having been swept away. It was found yesterday.

The All Americans defeated the Travellers six to three.

#### Monastir Is abandoned

Paris—Monastir has been abandoned by the Germans and Bulgars, and is now occupied by the Serbs, French and Italians, becoming the temporary capital of Serbia. The Serbs are pressing the retreating Teutons.

#### Prisoners Taken By British

London reports that since November 13 almost 7,000 prisoners have been taken by the British in the fighting on their part of the Somme front.

A terrific gale and snow storm is hampering the efforts of the Allies on the west front.

Scores of ships have been wrecked in the south Atlantic by a tidal wave. There is no estimate yet in regard to loss of life.

#### Deutschland Damage Suits

New London—The total of damage suits against the German submarine Deutschland in now \$187,000. She will be ready to leave again at the end of the week.

#### Wants Election Direct

Portland, Oregon—Senator Chamberlain announces that he will bring in at the coming Congress a proposal to amend the Constitution so that presidents in future may be elected by the direct vote of the people, in place of through the electoral college. The electoral idea was established by the founders of the republic when the population was small, and has been kept going ever since, principally out of respect to the fore-fads. Senator Chamberlain feels that the country is entirely too big for such a cumbersome system.

#### Huge Russian Loss

Berlin—It is estimated here that the Russians have lost over two million men since June 1.

#### Allies After Greek Propety

Athens—Admiral Fournet, commanding the fleet of the Allies, has sent a note to the Greek authorities demanding the surrender of all arms, ammunition and artillery, except 50,000 rifles in the hands of the Greek army.

#### Train Kills Lot Of Bandits

Laredo—In a train wreck between San Miguel and Dehesa, south of the border line, 159 were killed.

#### Aviation Record Broken


Binghamton—Ruth Law has smashed the aviation record between New York and Chicago, making the distance of 785 miles in 410 minutes.
