JOHNSON BEATS SHOOTING RECORD

General Samuel I. Johnson, in the shooting competition on the Punchbowl range at Honolulu scored 286 in slow and rapid fire from 200 to 600 yards. He made three 50s, a 48, a 46 and dropped to 42 in the 500 yards rapid-fire on account of wind-squalls suddenly coming up. It is claimed that this is the world's record for present-day shooting, beating the record established by Sergeant Burns, which was 283.

Gen. Johnson always was a crack shot with the army rifle and holds many medals won in seemingly difficult competitions. His enthusiasm has meant much to rifle work on Oahu and in a letter received on Kauai today states that he is hopeful that a full-grown rifle range may be established here in the near future. The General goes on to say that any promising marksman will be given the chance to make the team for the national competition this year.
