It was explained that owing to the prospective commandeering of some of the larger Inter-Island fleet it would be necessary for the Kinau to make two regular trips a week. After much study over the problem the Inter-Island Co. propose the following schedule.

The Kinau to leave Honolulu Monday night for Kauai. Returning leave Nawiliwili Tuesday evening. Leave Honolulu on second trip Wednesday night, returning leave Port Allen or Koloa Friday night.

There was a pretty general conviction that it would work a serious inconvenience to both the mail and passenger service of the windward side of the island to make Port Allen the point of departure; it would be much better to make it Koloa.

It was finally left to the transportation and mail service committees to take the matter up with the Inter-Island Co. and do whatever might be feasible in the matter.

Mr. Th. Brandt of Waimea made an earnest plea for the renewal of the Daily Wireless, suggesting that the Kauai Planters Association render the necessary financial assistance to re-establish the service.

Mr. Isenberg replied for that Association that no funds were available for such a purpose and that anyway it was an expensive luxury for a few people.

Finally the chairman ruled any action in this matter as out of order on this occasion since it was a special meeting called for special purposes. The matter was accordingly tabled with the consent of Mr. Brandt.

**Wheatless Day**

The Food Commission in Honolulu has appointed Wednesday, Nov. 14th, as the first official wheatless day to be observed not alone in Honolulu, but throughout the Territory. All Wednesdays thereafter will be wheatless days. The bakers, hotels, and homes will on that day serve only Graham bread. This is, of course, a voluntary movement, but it is hoped that all will fall in line. It is very much easier to do something with others than quite alone. Will you not, therefore, adopt Wednesday as your wheatless day?

Schools and other institutions in Honolulu are falling in line. Punahou uses only Graham bread. Mills School, which has been using Graham bread one day a week, has recently by the vote of the students adopted it for three days a week. Oahu jail uses Graham bread two days a week, thereby saving 65

pounds of flour a week. These men and boys know that everybody in America must do his part to help make up the 300,000,000 extra bushels of wheat which the Allies need and which America can supply only by practicing economy at home.

The Mokihana Club voted at its last meeting to do away with all refreshments except for an iced drink.

How much flour should I save? All you can. Mr. Hoover has asked that each person should save one pound a week. This is about one quart. Stated in another way, if you have been eating five slices of bread a day, cut it down to three and one-half slices. Learn to substitute other foods for flour. Eat more potatoes, sweet-potatoes, taro, and rice.

The women's Food Commission Leaflet recently distributed is an uncommonly good one. It is epigrammatic, reasonable and to the point. The refrain is stop waste and save on wheat and meat.
