

THE HORSE

The horse is a very noble quadruped, but when he is angry he will not do so. He is ridden on the spinal cord by the bridle, and sadly the driver places his foot on the stirrup and divides his lower limbs across the saddle and drives his animal to the meadow. He has a long mouth and his head is attached to the trunk by a long protuberance called a neck. He has four legs; two are in the front side and two are afterwards. These are the weapons on which he runs and also defends himself by extending those in the rear in a parallel direction toward his foe. But this he does only when in a vexatious mood. His feeding is generally grasses and grains. He is also useful to take on his back a man or woman as well as some cargo. He has power to run as fast as he could.
