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## SOCCER GAMES LAST SUNDAY

The McBryde-Lihue soccer game at Lihue last Sunday ended in a tie after one of the fastest games seen this season, each team scoring one goal in the second half. Being a tie game each team gets one point. This gives McBryde 10 points to Lihue's 7.

The game looked as though it was Lihue's as McBryde failed to score in the first half with the wind in their favor. Lihue did not take the aggressive in the first half. They contented themselves with preventing the visitors from scoring.

In the second half both teams went at it hammer and tongs. McBryde realizing they had a job ahead of them with the wind in Lihue's favor. Lihue's work was fast, and they were confident of a victory.

**Lihue Scores**

This confidence was made almost an assurance when Hutton kicked the ball about thirty yards for a goal after twelve minutes of play. It was a pretty kick and had so much speed on it that the goal keeper could not handle it.

**McBryde Scores on a Fluke**

About five minutes later McBryde worked the ball into Lihue's territory, and kicked it outside in attempting to score. The ball being Lihue's it was placed by Fountain to kick off and the referee blew his whistle for play to begin. The ball not being placed just to suit him, Fountain unthinkingly turned it over with his hands, and immediately had hands called on him.

This gave McBryde a free kick from right in front of the posts and Sinclair puts a swift one through for a goal.

Although each team had chances to score after this, good defense work prevented it.

### Y. M. C. A. NOTES

The third and last call for applications for the general scholarships offered by the War Council of the Y. M. C. A. is hereby given. Announcement was made at the meeting of the American Legion last Friday night the last month that free scholarships and since then a number of applications have been received. This is can be granted.

For those who have not seen previous notices and do not understand the local Y offers the following explanation. As a post-war service to the American soldier, the National War Work Council has set aside funds for the Y. M. C. A. Educational service for Demobilized men, available during the year ending Dec. 31, 1920. This service included first, honorary scholarships for general education in Y. M. C. A. schools and other approved schools, in correspondent courses conducted by the United Y. M. C. A. Schools and in technical schools, colleges and universities; second, Occupational Readjustment Service; third, Reconstruction Lectures; fourth, Americanization.

This fund (over \$3,000,000) has been apportioned over the United States according to population. In Hawaii the service that has been adapted consists in collegiate courses, local Y. M. C. A. schools, correspondence schools, and Americanization work. There is a territorial committee which passes on applications for college scholarships. (Three Kauai boys attending college have received college scholarship awards.) The only form of educational service now remaining for Kauai is that of correspondence schools. Two are already taking these courses.

There are absolutely "no strings" attached to this service. Applications may be made for either the correspondence courses offered by the United Y. M. C. A. schools or in other duly accredited schools such as the I. C. S. Hamilton Institute, LaSalle Extension and similar institutions. The

## Supervisors Hold Monthly Meeting

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Kauai held its regular monthly and business meeting at its office as usual on Wednesday December 1st, 1920, at 9:30 A. M. Present: H. D. Wishard, Chairman, T. Brandt, W. D. McBryde, Jos. F. Bettencourt, Jr. and A. Menefoglio.

The Board, after examination of the several demands submitted, approved them against the appropriations listed hereinbelow.

Financial reports Nos. 255, 259a, 259aaa, and 259b for November 1920, being the Treasurer, Treasurer-Auditor, Auditor's Report of receipts and disbursements to November 30, 1920, and the Joint Report by the Chairman, Attorney and Auditor, were referred to Mr. Brandt for advice.

A resolution (P 1843) urging the City and County Governments of the Territory to take measures, possible and necessary, to abate the infraction of the Prohibition Law, and adopted by the Territorial Civic Convention at Hilo, Hawaii, during September 23-26, 1920, was received and referred to the County Sheriff for necessary action.

Certificates of Authority (P 1844) of G. Porter and A. W. Van Valkenburg as resident Assistant Secretaries of the Aetna Casualty and Surety Co., of Hartford, Connecticut, at Honolulu, Hawaii, to act for that Company was received and placed on file.

A request (P 1845) from A. J. Caldeira, Supt. of Koloa Water Works, for the purchase and laying of a 3 inch pipeline from J. I. Silva's store at Kalaheo to Kukuioiolo Camp so as to give the customers a better and more adequate supply of water was received and referred to the County Road Engineer with power to act in the premises.

A communication (attached to P 1813) from Jos. K. Clark enclosing two bills amounting, in the aggregate, to the sum of \$80.84 for hire of autos used on behalf of Kauai County during the October and November 1918 Primary and General elections were received and the bills by unanimous vote were ordered paid.

The following requisitions for school supplies or for necessary repairs were referred to the County Road Engineer with power to act on them: Waimea, Kalaheo, Kauai High, and Hanamaulu.

Reports (P 1847) on the conditions of school buildings etc, for the month of November, 1920, were received from Anahola, Kilauea and Hanalei and were placed on file.

A petition (P 1848) from J. Okano and others praying for the extension of the County's pipeline in Kapaa town to bring it near their residences at Kapaa was granted and the County Road Engineer was authorized to make the extension prayed for.

A bid from the Standard Oil Co. to furnish asphaltum was received and referred to the County Engineer for advice.

The report (P 1849) of the County Road Supervisor for the month of November, 1920, was received and filed. It is substantially as follows: Road patching was carried on in every district.

In Koloa district the main stretches of road needing asphalt were finished and patching throughout the district was done also. Some grading work was done on the Catholic Church road but rain prevented the crushing outfit from working.

A few days of grading was done in the Kapaa homesteads and two culverts put in but bad weather prevented very much work being done. Some asphalt was put down on the Hanalei landing road.

The fill approaches to the Nawiliwili bridge were finished to a point to allow traffic to pass both ways.

Several camp houses were moved down from Waialua to Anahola to house the men working on the proposed bridge. Work will soon start again.

The Court House addition at Waimea has been completed.

The new science building at the High School has been finished with the exception of tables, shelves, etc.

The Kapaa School addition was completed. One bungalow class room was put up on the Hanamaulu new school lot, the second room is now under construction. Work has

started on the new Kalaheo School building.

Upon a motion from Mr. Brandt, duly seconded, the chairman and Messrs. R. F. Middleton and A. Menefoglio were appointed a committee to investigate the situation with a view to improving the parking space for automobiles at Nawiliwili Landing.

Regarding a request by the Hon. William C. Achi Jr. for the appropriation of the sum of \$3,000.00 for purchasing law books for the Circuit Court of the Fifth Circuit, (being Kauai County) by a unanimous vote it was agreed to insert this item in the budget of expenditures of the County for 1921 for salaries, public improvements, etc., at the next regular meeting on the 15th inst.

A draft would be Ordinance No. 15 to amend Ordinance No. 8 which provided for the maintenance, management and operation of the Samuel Mahelona Memorial Hospital in so far as it relates to the power of its Trustees under said Ordinance to expend moneys appropriated by the Board of Supervisors was received, and after general discussion on the same, consideration of the Ordinance was postponed until the regular meeting of the 15th inst.

Upon the motion of Mr. McBryde seconded by Mr. Bettencourt Jr., the sum of Six Thousand Seven Hundred Forty-eight Dollars and Forty-four cents, by a unanimous vote, was appropriated out of available moneys in the Treasury for the following purposes, viz:

Upon request of the County Road Supervisor, after having made convincing explanations, the Board, by a unanimous vote, authorized him to

(1) give the County's gas engine the repairs it needed;

(2) sell the County's scrap iron as he may see fit; and

(3) to purchase the necessary pipe so to secure water from the County's main in the neighborhood for the use of the Kalaheo new school grounds.

Upon a request by the County Sheriff, the Board, upon the motion of Mr. McBryde, seconded by Mr. Bettencourt Jr., by vote, authorized him to give the Courthouse and jailer's quarters at Koloa the necessary repairs the buildings needed.

Upon the motion of Mr. Bettencourt Jr., seconded by Mr. Menefoglio, the County Road Supervisor, by unanimous vote, was authorized to call in bids for furnishing this County with

Two Road Scrapers; Two Asphalt Heaters; and One Cleveland Tractor, which bids must be filed with the Board on or before 9 a.m. of Wednesday, January 5, 1921.

The County Clerk, after requesting for authority to purchase a supply of green ballot paper for the County's use, was asked to secure quotations and report at next meeting.

## Kapaa Notes

Mr. James Spalding departed for the mainland via Honolulu on Tuesday last. He announced that he will be back in time for the New Year sports at Waipouli.

Mr. L. C. Johnson, local homesteader, has disposed of his property and will soon leave Kapaa for the mainland.

Dr. Elton B. Jones, Chiropractor, has a temporary office location in Kapaa next to the Kapaa Drug Store, fitted to give professional service to those in need of Chiropractic treatments. He will be permanently located in Kapaa after Monday.

Joseph Scharsch, Jr., who saw service in France with the A. E. F. during the late World War, returned Friday morning, coming all the way from Germany via New York and San Francisco. He returned to Kapaa after the war but after a stay of several months, again enlisted for service with the American Army in Germany. He is certainly some traveller.

Plans had been partially prepared by Antone Reis for an invitation to the Braves Jr., baseball team of Honolulu to visit us during the New Year, but owing to the sudden departure for the coast of Mr. Spalding, the matter is "up in the air" and the promoters have not yet been able to announce anything definite, although the date is less than a month away.

Increased business at the Bank of Kauai, Ltd., has made additional help necessary, and Mr. Albert Bush has been added to the force.

Mr. E. M. Cheatham, homesteader, according to a report of the local authorities, saved \$45.00 by appealing to the circuit court from a decision by the local district magistrate several months ago, fining him \$50.00 for travelling without a tail light and falling to stop when ordered to do so. Judge Achi, after reviewing the case, reduced the fine to only \$5.00 in view of it being Mr. Cheatham's first offense of the kind. The judge, in rendering his decision, incidentally remarked that other offenses of a much more serious nature against the traffic laws were being continually committed, and that if those motorists who travelled with unfrosted globes, and those who travelled with only one headlight burning were brought before him, he would endeavor to give the offenders jail sentences instead of light fines.

The homestead roads, with the almost continuous rains we have been blessed (?) with during the past few months, are in a condition that makes travel to Kapaa and Kealia a hardship instead of a pleasure as it used to be. Taking some of our representatives and senators up there, and having them guide their own machines through the mud, would be a good way to impress upon them the necessity of appropriating money to give better transportation facilities to the homesteaders, in order that they may have a fair chance to succeed. We do not profess to know much about the laws of the Territory, and perhaps it is a county matter. If so, then by all means give our supervisors a ride up there one of these days.

### IN COURT

The Bettencourt-Advertiser libel suit, set for to-day in the fifth circuit court, has been postponed until next term. The legal firm of Peters and Smith, attorneys for the Advertiser, are tied up in a long case in Honolulu and were unable to come over at this time for the case here.

## INTERSCHOLASTIC PLAYGROUND BALL

The deciding match in playground baseball for districts 2 and 3 was played at Kapaa diamond last Saturday morning between the Hanalei and Lihue girls' teams and the Kilauea and Lihue boys' teams. Both games were played surprisingly well and it is unfortunate that more spectators could not be present. The girls played first and made a very pretty showing in their natty bloomer and middy uniforms. The Hanalei girls played pluckily throughout but the Lihue galaxy was just enough bigger and stronger to keep the lead. Lihue won this game by a score of 15 to 12. J. O. Warner was the umpire.

The boys of Kilauea and Lihue then entered the arena. From the umpire's "Play ball" to the last out this was a battle to suit the most sanguine fans. Fast and snappy on both sides several goose eggs were hung up at the start. Then the hitting began and the race was closely run to the end. At the finish of the seventh inning Lihue, thinking the game over prepared to give their yell of triumph. But the umpire thought differently and called them back to play off nine innings. Kilauea spurred to new hope, tightened up and allowed Lihue but a run or two more the rest of the game. Lihue, a little sullen over the prolonged suspense, played safe and consistently and finished the match with but one run to spare. The score was 16 to 14. H. W. Page was the umpire.

This game leaves the island championship yet to be decided. The big event will come off next Saturday at 2 P. M. on Waimea grounds. The girls' game will be between Lihue and Makaweli; the boys' match is Lihue vs Waimea. The umpire for the girls' game will be Mr. Sessions and for the boys, Mr. Damkroger. The public is invited to see the excitement.

The executive committee of the Kauai Public School Athletic League held an important meeting at the county Y. M. C. A. office last Saturday afternoon. Miss Elsie Wilcox presided with all members present except two. The resignation of Mr. Gerhard Hofgaard, who is leaving for the coast, was accepted with a vote of appreciation for Mr. Hofgaard's services and deep interest as a director of the League. A permanent constitution and by-laws, recommended by the committee, was carefully considered and with suitable alterations was adopted. To facilitate the present system of transportation of teams it was decided to make each principal responsible for securing transportation of his school team. The subject of basket ball as the next sport in order was discussed and it was decided to adopt Spalding's 1919-1920 rules as official for the league this season. The games committee met at the close of the regular meeting and arranged the schedule. The basket ball games are to be completed by the last of January.

### THE PLANTERS' MEETING

The various plantation managers and others interested in the sugar business returned from the Planters' Meeting last Friday. Among them were A. F. Alexander, E. Cropp, E. W. Broadbent, R. D. Moler, D. L. Larsen, and G. N. Wilcox.
