From the Other Islands

HONOLULU MAN A "SEA SCOUT CHIEF"

A recent article in the "Outlook" contains a most interesting account of the doings and organization of the "Sea Scout Department", a branch of the Boy Scout movement that has been a going concern on the mainland for some time, but which hasn't been started here as yet, so far as we know.

Mr. James Wilder of Honolulu, the father of the Boy Scout movement on these Islands, has recently been made Chief Sea-scout. Mr. Wilder is now in New York and would be glad for any of his friends to write to him concerning the Sea Scout movement. His address is 164 East 38th St. New York City. He writes "I believe we've struck the thing that will do more for America than all the tomfool spell-binding we've heard for the last few years."

This organization teaches the boys useful nautical knowledge. Only registered Scouts of at least 15 years of age and weighing no less than 120 pounds are eligible for membership and no group may consist of less than 9 members.

As in the original scout movement, the groups are graded according to proficiency.

The classes are known by the are known by the names of different types of vessels. The lowest grade is the sloop class and the highest the ship class.

The whole movement is organized in accordance with nautical terminology and is meant for the boys fortunate enough to live near the sea.

Knowing Mr. Wilder as we do, we feel confident that before long the Sea Scout movement will be in full swing in Hawaii and that the home grown boys will take to it as a duck to the water.

TRAINING OF PRINTERS AT HOME PROPOSED BY HONOLULU PROPRIETORS

There is prospect that Hawaii will not only soon turn out her reporters and editors, but printers and linotype operators as well.

The reporters and editors are in the making in the McKinley high school class in journalism, and it is now proposed by a committee of employing printers of Honolulu, of which Ed Towse is chairman, to establish a printing trade department of the territorial trade school. To this end an addition of \$10,800 has been made to the budget for the trade school which will be presented to the legislature.

Ken C. Bryan, territorial director of industrial education, is working with the printers' committee on plans for the school, which they hope to see opened in September.—Advertiser.

FORMER LAWMAKER APPOINTED DISTRICT MAGISTRATE ON KAUAI

J. S. Chandler, member of the territorial house of representatives, has been appointed by Judge James L. Coke, chief justice of the supreme court, as district magistrate for Koloa succeeding Judge David K. Kapahee, who has held the position for many years and whose term of office expired recently. The district magistrate's term of office is two years. Judge Chandler went to Honolulu last Saturday and took the oath of office before Chief Justice Coke Monday morning in chambers and returned by the Kinau Monday night for his home in Koloa. Politically, Judge Chandler is a Democrat, as are the present judges of the supreme court.

\$2,000,000 NEEDED FOR TEACHERS' PAY

According to estimates furnished Delbert E. Metzger, territorial treasurer, by the department of public instruction, the requirements for public school teachers' salaries for the calendar year 1921 will be \$2,052,513.62, this amount to be raised through a tax levy on real and personal property for the present year, says the Star-Bulletin.

The amount of money required for salaries in 1921 is \$526,733 in excess of the amount required during 1920. During the present year the payroll of the department of public instruction, in so far as teachers are concerned, will be at the rate of \$178,586.66 a month for the first eight months, and at the rate of \$183,601.66 a month for the remaining four months of the year.

At the special session of the legislature last year certain increases in the salaries of public school teachers, ranging from \$15 to \$30 a month, were allowed. The new schedule went into effect January 1, this year and will continue until January 1, 1921, on which date the new salary schedule for the forthcoming biennial period will go into effect.
