



**Schools Running Short
of Pay Roll Money**

The fact that the school fund is considerably shy each month is compelling the schools to have to ask the teachers to take extra large and unwieldy classes, says the Honolulu Star-Bulletin.

The amount for the monthly pay-roll of the school department of the territory beginning September 1, is \$183,000, being \$17,000 less than that needed to keep up the teaching force to its required number, Vaughan MacCaughy, superintendent of Public Instruction, announced yesterday. As a result of this condition classes will be doubled up and teachers in some instances will have to teach two grades.

"The board of education asked the legislature at this last session to appropriate \$200,000 monthly for teachers' salaries," said MacCaughy. "It was proposed more than a year ago that we would need that amount for the coming school year but the legislature could not see the matter in that light.

"The phenomenal growth in enrollment of our primary, grammar and high schools all over the territory during the past two years was the basis upon which we submitted our figures to the legislature.

"With the University of Hawaii as a goal, pupils in the public schools here are taking full courses in the grammar and high schools so that they can qualify for the university.

"In the old days, children who could not afford to go to the mainland to complete their education, generally finished their education in the higher grades of the grammar schools and attendance in the high schools was small in comparison with the attendance today."

**JUDGE ACHI TELLS HOW
TO RAISE CHILDREN**

Judge William C. Achi, who is taking Judge Bank's place at Honolulu, is reported by the Honolulu Advertiser as saying that too much negative and not enough positive instruction is given to the little fellows of the Boys' Industrial School and elsewhere.

"There are too many 'don'ts' for the conduct of boys and too few 'dos' is the opinion of Judge W. C. Achi Jr., of the Kauai circuit, temporarily filling the vacation vacancy in the local circuit court.

In discussing the problems of boys who are rounded up before him by probation officers for the various offenses for which boys are picked up, Judge Achi said that there is not sufficient community interest manifested in boys when they are ready, after a service at the Boys' Industrial School, to take their place among their fellow men as workers.

"The boys at the industrial school receive training in trades and they are fitted for work in iron works, machine shops and other industrial establishments," said the Judge.

"There are certain organizations which give aid in this work, but there should be harmonious co-operation among all organizations that have the community welfare at heart.

"I believe we issue too many 'don'ts' to direct the conduct of boys. We hedge them about with all sorts of restrictions and continually yell 'don't' to them.

"If we could switch and display a list of what to do's and then all of us get back and encourage the boys they would emerge into manhood better prepared to take their parts as citizens.

"The boys at the industrial school learn all sorts of trades. On leaving but fairly well equipped to go into establishments that need manual labor, they are often left out in the cold, because they are shy and don't know exactly how to ask for a job. That's where the men of our welfare organizations come in.

"Boys go wrong very often because their home environments are not the best. Too often parents just let boys grow up like topsies. They exercise no control over them whatever. Some times the parents are too busy providing the meals and clothes for their offspring, but too often it is wanton neglect on the part of parents that causes boys to wander away from the right path. There is good reason for the passing of laws requiring more responsibility on the part of parents towards their children."
